

Gene Craft was in the cast of the play "Don't Drink the Water" held in March at the Van Wert Civic Theatre in Van Wert.





Gathered Around the Cross

Were you there when they crucified my Lord? There is still something hauntingly spiritual and powerful about that question. In truth, even those who were there may not have had any idea about what was really taking place. Only in retrospect - especially with the perspective of faith - do some people like the writers of the gospels tell us that something cosmically significant and everlastingly important was taking place at the moment when Jesus was on that cross.

If we just take the perspective of John's Gospel we find that Jesus must look hard in order to discover any true friends in the crowds gathered around the cross. But look he does, and in the process he sees his mother and the unnamed disciple; then all the others. There are the other two being crucified with him. Far into the background are Pilate and the chief priests, and off in hiding are the rest of the disciples, including bold Peter, sulking now for having denied Jesus.

But what looks like defeat is, strangely, the fulfillment of a life directed toward such a moment. At least in John's Gospel the picture we have of Jesus is of someone who is about as far from a helpless victim as you can get. It isn't that he would wish his death, for indeed he had prayed with real tears that this was a cup which might be taken away. But when finally the time comes for him to drink this cup, he does so with a kind of commanding presence that has eternal consequences.

At the moment of Jesus' death John tells us not once, but twice, that Jesus' death completes or finishes his work. The final words - so difficult to utter because it takes his last breath - "It is finished." One biblical commentator looking at this text wrote: "Jesus died with the cry of the victor on his lips."

What was finished, of course, was just about to start; except for those four who stood by the cross. For them, it will take a while before they can come to terms with what happened. It will take some time for Jesus' own disciples to be regathered and spirited for the enterprise that lies before them. It will take some time before Paul gets turned around by a bolt of lightning. A number of years will pass before there are some followers who feel compelled to write down the entire story.

On that crossmarked day so long ago only Jesus, it seems, had any inkling about the eternal ramifications of what was taking place. There were, of course, those faithful witnesses who stood there in their own confusion taking it all in, but not knowing how much we would care to know all that they were able to share. Others like Pilate and the chief priests simply wished for the day to come quickly to an end, to be out of sight and out of mind.

Now we find ourselves reflecting on what took place on the day Jesus died. From the perspective of the cross, when Jesus said "It is finished," he was saying that the bridge of reconciliation was finally and completely established. This bridge moreover was laid down in love and sacrifice and meant for everyone in the world. All who walk into this forgiveness will need to pause by his cross, if not today, then on another day, and see Jesus looking at them with the love he had for his mother and that disciple. He looks at us with the same love.

To be used for such a purpose, caused the tree great distress and grief. Jesus observed this and made the tree this promise.

"Never again shall the dogwood grow large enough to be used as a cross. Henceforth, it shall be slender, bent and twisted. Its blossoms shall be in the form of a cross with the print of the nails in each petal. In the center of the flower will be the crown of thorns, and all who see it will remember that it was upon a dogwood tree I was crucified. Therefore, this tree shall not be destroyed, but cherished as a reminder of my death upon the cross."

God hath not promised we shall not know Toil and temptations, trouble and woe; He hath not told us we shall not bear Many a burden, many a care.



Ham and Cheese Sandwiches

Ingredients		Instructions By Kathy White
1 lb	Ham sliced thin	Place rolls on a large cookie sheet or jelly roll pan. Place one slice of cheese and ham on each roll. Place last 5 ingredients in a saucepan and cook until bubbly. Close sandwiches and drizzle most of sauce over top. Bake at 275 degrees for 10 min. Take out and drizzle the remaining sauce over the top. Place back in oven at 350 for an additional 10 minutes. Serve warm. These can be reheated by wrapping in foil and warming in oven. They can also be made ahead and frozen individually in foil and taken out and baked as needed.


Butterfly Symbol





Butterfly Sand Painting

To sand paint a butterfly, you will need: poster board, sand, food coloring, small jars or yogurt containers, glue, paint brush, black felt pen or crayon. Then just follow these directions.







- 4. Paint small section of design with glue. Let it set up and become tacky. Sprinkle with desired color sand. Let dry. Gently shake off extra sand. Repeat for each different color until the surface is all covered with colored sand.
- 5. Allow the butterfly to dry flat overnight, especially if the layer of glue was thick.

Living Our Faith

Welcome Easter!

All through March and part of April we observe the Season of Lent, so when Easter is finally here there are lots of great ways to welcome this joyful season! Try some of these ideas with your friends and family.

Read Some Books

This is a great way to explore the wonder, mystery, sadness, and joy of Jesus' death and resurrection. Public libraries have many fiction and non-fiction books on the new life, hope, and joy - all themes of Easter.

Plant an Easter Garden

Prepare for Easter by making a portable Easter garden. You can enjoy the powerful fragrance of hyacinths, the sweet scent of paperwhite narcissus, the cheerful color of tulips, as well as other bulbs, if you plan ahead. Usually these bulbs are planted about six months before they flower, but if you refrigerate the bulbs you can get results in a matter of weeks.

Hot Cross Buns

Hot cross buns are part of many family Easter traditions. Originally eaten by the Saxons to honor their goddess Eostre, the buns are marked with a cross as it is believed the bun represented the moon and the cross the moon's quarters. To Christians, the cross symbolizes the crucifixion.

Purchase frozen raisin bread dough and let it thaw according to package directions. Form into buns and bake according to directions. While the buns are cooling, mix some frosting using these ingredients:

1 cup plus 2 Tbsp powdered sugar

1/2 tsp vanilla extract

pinch of salt

4 tsp milk, to make a thick, pipeable icing

Use the frosting to make a cross

on each bun. Enjoy!
