





Prayer

Praying With Our Bodies By Corinne Piper

Engaging my body in movement while praying is one way to keep my mind focused because my body is busy doing something. Some people dance. I have done that on one occasion, but it isn't the most natural for me. I have felt the urge to stand during a hymn because I just couldn't express my reverence while sitting. Walking is another way that works for me. But there are times when I can't do any of these things. An alternative is to just use our hands. I noticed others moving their hands at church last Sunday when we sang "Lord, I Lift Your Name on High". Other times, I have seen people using their hands during prayer to show God they were ready to receive His gifts.

Recently, Guidepost Magazine posted an article on praying with our hands and I give you their highlights:

1. Palms Open

Start a prayer by extending your arms, opening your hands, and turning your palms up as a gesture of openness and receptivity to the "still small voice" of God.

2. Palms Flat

Next, turn your palms over and hold them flat while envisioning your worries and fears dropping into God's hands.

3. Hands Folded

After a while in that position, press your hands together, like the famous "Praying Hands" painting. Ask the Holy Spirit, on the basis of Romans 8:26, to intercede—to translate our praying hands into all the petitions we *could* or *should* be praying.

4. Hands Lifted

Finally, lift "holy hands," a gesture of gratitude and praise. Thank God for listening, Jesus for the gift of oneness with God, and the Holy Spirit for the guidance and wisdom to enact what you have learned.

Allow yourself the freedom to move in your prayers, no matter where you are. As the old spiritual goes: I'm goin' a sing when the Spirit says sing, (or raise my hands) and obey the Spirit of the Lord.



History of a Hymn

His Eye Is on the Sparrow

"Then Sings My Soul", By Robert J. Morgan

1905

Are not two sparrows sold for a copper coin? And not one of them falls to the ground apart from your Father's will. Matthew 10:29

Most people have a hobby of some sort to provide a healthy diversion from the rigors of work. Long ago, there was a woodworker in Nazareth who counted bird-watching among His diversions. We can make that assumption, because Jesus later referred frequently to bird-life in His sermon, saying things like:

- "Are not two sparrows sold for copper coin? And not one of them falls to the ground from your Father's will" (Matthew 10:29).
- "Look at the birds of the air, for they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns; yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they?" (Matthew 6:26)
- "Consider the ravens...?" (Luke 12:26).
- "Do not fear... you are of more value than many sparrows" (Luke 12:7)

It was this theme that caused the author of "God Will Take care of You," to write, a year later, another great hymn on God's care: "His Eye Is on the Sparrow."

Civilla Durfee Martin was a Canadian by birth, born August21, 1869, in Nova Scotia. She became a school and music teacher, but when she married Dr. Walter Martin, an evangelist, she gave up teaching to travel with him and assist in his meetings.

This is her account of the writing of this song:

Early in the Spring of 1905, my husband and I were sojourning in Elmira, New York. We contracted a deep friendship for a couple by the name of Mr. and Mrs. Doolittletrue saints of God. Mrs. Doolittle had been bedridden for nigh twenty years. Her husband was an incurable cripple who had to propel himself to and from his business in a wheelchair. Despite their afflictions they lived happy Christian lives, bringing inspiration and comfort to all who knew them. One day while we were visiting with the Doolittle's, my husband commented on their bright hopefulness and asked them for the secret of it. Mrs. Doolittle's reply was simple: "His eye is on the sparrow, and I know he watches me." The beauty of this simple expression of boundless faith gripped the hearts and fired the imagination of Dr. Martin and me. The hymn "His Eye Is on the Sparrow" was the outcome of that experience.

The day after writing the song, she mailed it to the famous Gospel composer, Charles Gabriel, who penned the music.



SUPPLIES NEEDED:

- One pair of blunt scissors removed from the package (rounded tip, only).
- Three 70-count bound notebooks.
- One 30-centimeter, 12" ruler.
- One hand-held pencil sharpener (removed from package).
- One large eraser (no pencil cap erasers).
- Six new, unsharpened pencils with erasers (removed from the package).
- One box of 24 crayons.
- **\$2.00** for processing and shipping kits.




Ingredients		Instructions
