


Angel

Angel, which means “messenger” in both Hebrew and Greek, is a spirit-being God created to perform tasks for him. In the Bible, angels appear in human form (always as men) to deliver divine messages. Angels appear separately to Joseph and Mary, announcing Jesus’ upcoming birth, and “a multitude of the heavenly host” (Luke 2:13) tells shepherds of the Savior’s arrival. Scripture offers little information about angels, though we know some rebelled against God. Among the holy angels, categories include cherubim and seraphim.



Hat and Mitten Christmas Tree.



Annual Christmas Cookie and Goodie Walk



Meeting Jesus in Scripture



When it comes to Jesus, the amazing thing is how little we really know about the facts of his life. But as fascinating as it would be to know the names of Jesus' childhood playmates or the address of his home in

Nazareth, what is truly important about Jesus lies elsewhere.

One reason why historians are shy on solid biographical data about Jesus is that outside of the Bible we have almost no historical record of Jesus - only a stray sentence here and there. What we know of Jesus essentially comes from the New Testament, and the authors of those documents start with their belief in the resurrection. The accounts of Jesus' birth and ministry are refracted through the prism of the church's faith in him as the risen Lord, and they are told in ways that show that Jesus was Lord from the very beginning.

Take, for example, the account of Jesus' birth. According to Luke, Jesus was born in the village of Bethlehem - a long way from Nazareth where his human parents, Joseph and Mary, lived. How did this happen? Luke reports that Joseph and the pregnant Mary traveled from Nazareth to Bethlehem because Emperor Augustus had ordered every person in the whole empire to be registered in a census, and everybody had to sign up in their own hometowns. So, Joseph, a descendant of King David, was obliged to register in Bethlehem, the ancestral city of David, and Jesus happened to be born while he and Mary were on that trip.

Contemporary historians, however, have questioned some of the details of Luke's story. As biblical scholar Raymond Brown points out, while historians do know about various Roman censuses and tax registrations, there is no evidence at all of any such worldwide census under Augustus and no example of a Roman census where people had to travel to their ancestral towns to register (*The Birth of the Messiah*, p. 413). So why does Luke include these details in his story?

We do not really know the answer, but the solution is almost surely to be found in Luke's gifts as a faithful theologian, rather than in his tools as a scientific historian. Theologically, Luke believed that a messiah would come who would sit on the throne of King David. The prophet Micah had predicted that it would be from Bethlehem that this Messiah would come (Micah 5:2). Luke also has a universal theology - a conviction that Jesus is not just a local Messiah but the Savior of all humanity. Looking back at Jesus' birth through the eyes of his faith, then, no wonder Luke saw something prophetic (like Bethlehem, the city of David) and something universal (like a worldwide census under Augustus) as parts of the event. Luke's purpose is to tell the theological truth and to show how the hand of God, so clearly present in establishing Jesus as the fulfillment of scriptural prophecy and as the Savior of all, was at work all along - even in Jesus' birth.

So how can we know Jesus Christ - really know him? The church would say the more you study the biblical accounts of Jesus with a teachable spirit the more you will encounter the living Christ every day. And the more you encounter the living Christ, the more you will recognize and trust his voice and see his face in the pages of scripture. Faith and history, belief and scripture, work together to bring us into the presence of Christ.

Our Church History (1983-1984)

The women's work continued in the church with new circles being formed. One was an exercise circle, and another was the Piecemakers Circle. The Piecemakers was a quilting group and their project for financing renovation was the name quilt. For \$5 a name, the name would be embroidered on a diamond and eventually the quilt was finished, approximately 76"x84", and hung above the south stairs in the education annex. More than \$1000 was raised.

In 1983, the Piecemakers Circle, first named So Sew, did their first quilt show in the education wing of the church. They had quilt shows for 9 more years.

The Bell Choir, besides playing for worship services, had a circuit of Christmas concerts at nursing homes. It was under the direction of Jane Brown.

The Joy Singers caroled to the shut-ins living in the Elida area. The Joy Singers were directed by Linda Holman, later by Judy Chaffins.

Near the end of the year, the furnace developed a crack so serious that replacement was necessary. The Fred Decker family, custodians, were given a cash gift because of the extra work.

During Lent, 1984, each Elida area church hosted and another church presented the service.

In 1984 the Joy Singers purchased new robes, financed with a Rock-A-Thon and pledges. The church held an All Church Birthday Party, sponsored by Mary Steiner.

St. Paul's celebrated the Bicentennial of Methodism during the year of 1984 on five special occasions. On March 15, the bicentennial committee met to plan the events that would portray our heritage through the last 200 years.

On May 20, 1984, Aldersgate Sunday, a musical jubilee was held with all church choirs taking a part. An old-fashioned hymn sing would not let us forget our great hymns – a great number Wesleyan – that have enriched our church and faith.

This year was also the centennial year for United Methodist Women. A pageant portraying "The Continuing Journey of Women in Mission" was presented by its members on July 8, 1984.


Ingredients		Instructions
1 box	Brownie mix (not family size)	<p>Bake brownie according to pkg. directions in 9x9 pan lined with foil. During last 5 min. of baking, remove from oven and sprinkle chopped peanut butter cups and chopped peanuts on top. Return to oven for remaining 5 min. to melt chocolate.</p> <p>As soon as you pull them out of oven, spread the top to smooth. Let brownies cool.</p> <p>In microwave safe bowl, combine choc. chips, peanut butter and butter. Heat in microwave for 1 minute or until melted. Stir in cereal, vanilla and salt until evenly combined.</p> <p>Pour over brownies and smooth. Chill until set, about 2 hours. Cut into squares.</p>

Make this yummy treat to give to family and friends at Christmas, when we celebrate Jesus' birthday.



What you need:

- Nonstick cooking spray
- 3 cups chocolate chips
- Microwave-safe bowl
- Spoon or spatula
- 2 Tbsp. shortening
- Baking tray lined with wax paper
- Red and green M&M's (or sprinkles)

What you do:


1. Lightly spray bowl and wax paper.
2. Microwave chocolate chips in bowl for one-minute intervals until chocolate is melted. (Stir after each minute.)
3. Stir in shortening. Heat in 10-second intervals, stirring until smooth.
4. Pour chocolate onto tray and firmly press in M&M's or sprinkles.
5. Refrigerate until firm. Remove bark and break into pieces.

Living Our Faith

Present Possibilities, Frontiers of Faith

Brazilian theologian Rubem Alves called hope “the suspicion ... that the frontiers of the possible are not determined by the limits of the present.” Who among us doesn't sometimes imagine our future based solely on present-day obstacles? Even biblical heroes did so.

Abraham and Sarah laughed at God's promise of a child, seeing only their present circumstance of old age. Only in hindsight could Joseph see how God turned slavery in Egypt into great good.

At first another Joseph, learning his fiancée was pregnant, believed his world was limited to two possibilities: shame Mary publicly or divorce her quietly. But his heart was open to God's message: “What is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. [Her] son ... will save his people from their sins” (Matthew 1:20-21, NIV). How exceedingly far this future must have seemed from the limits of Joseph's present.

Christmas is a reminder that God calls us all into frontiers of the future we never could have dreamed!

Overcoming Despair

Christmas can be a difficult time for people who are hurting or grieving. In the 1860s, poet Henry Wadsworth Longfellow had reason to despair: America was at war with itself, his son was severely wounded in battle and his wife died in a fire. The first Christmas after his wife's death, Longfellow wrote, “How inexpressibly sad are all holidays.”

Three years later, on Christmas Day 1864, Longfellow penned a poem that later became the song “I Heard the Bells on Christmas Day.” The lyrics move from despair to hope — and, thanks to Jesus, so can we.

And in despair I bowed my head.
There is no peace on earth, I said!
For hate is strong, and mocks the song
of peace on earth, good will to men!

Then pealed the bells more loud and deep:
God is not dead, nor doth he sleep!
The wrong shall fail, the right prevail,
with peace on earth, good will to men!
