MARY THE PROPHET

The Bible is full of stories of God calling prophets, and their responses. Often, they are reluctant: Moses claimed to be a nobody, Isaiah said, "I am a person of unclean lips," and Jeremiah said, "I am too young."

Yet the prophet Mary not only says "let it be, according to your word" (or, "I'm ready to serve" according to The Message) but bursts into song, proclaiming the goodness of God.

At this time of year, we see Mary a lot, usually dressed in blue, in Christmas cards, manger scenes, and nativity pageants. But do we really notice her? This young, previously unknown teenager from Nazareth made an amazing speech (Luke 1:47-54) and – in addition to birthing the Messiah – did a number of other powerful acts in her life as well.

In the midst of this busy season, pause and pay a little attention to Mary. Read her story, and listen to her challenge.

Reflecting on an Advent Hymn...

The Season of Advent includes the four Sundays leading up to Christmas. There are many traditions connected with Advent. The most familiar is that of lighting candles on an Advent wreath

Another tradition involves singing the verses of the hymn "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" on the seven days before Christmas. The verses were based on ancient prayers known as the "O Antiphons" that were first sung in Latin.

Most modern hymnals contain a version of this hymn, although the number and order of verses sometimes changes, as does the translation. Each verse of this hymn talks about Jesus coming into our world and uses a different name for Jesus.

The words to the hymn are written below. Being very old, they may seem rather strange, so a brief explanation is given for some of the terms, along with a suggestion for reflecting on each verse. Sing a different verse each day of the week for the four weeks of Advent

O come, O come, Emmanuel, and ransom captive Israel that mourns in lonely exile here, until the Child of God appear. **Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel** shall come to you, O Israel.

This verse does not refer to the modern nation of Israel, but to all of God's people (often called "Israel" in the Bible). It asks that Jesus help set people free. Who are people in the world who need to be set free? Where are some places where the good news of God's love that Jesus brings can make a difference?

O come, O Wisdom from on high, and order all things far and nigh; to us the path of knowledge show, and help us in that way to go.

In the Bible, Wisdom doesn't mean

knowledge or the things we learn from books. Instead, it's when God's Spirit is inside us and helps us know, deep in our heart, what is right and how God wants us to live. Proverbs 8 tells us that Wisdom helped God create the world, and 1 Corinthians 1:30 tells us that Jesus is the Wisdom of God. Talk about something you know by heart.

O come, O come, O Adonai, who came to all on Sinai high, and from its peace a single law proclaimed in majesty and awe.

Adonai is a Hebrew word used to refer to the name for God that Moses learned when speaking to God at the burning bush (Ex 3:2). Sinai is the mountain where God gave the torah or law to the people. Reflect on how Jesus helps us learn how to live in God's way.

O come, O Rod of Jesse's stem, from every foe deliver them that trust your mighty power to save,

and give them victory o'er the grave.

Jesse was King David's father. King David was considered a great king who was fair and good and the people longed for a new ruler from the line of David. He was also a shepherd, and Jesus - who was descended from David - showed us that being a shepherd was a wonderful way to be a leader. Who are some people who show servant leadership?

O come, O Key of David, come, and open wide our heavenly home;

make safe the way that leads on high, and close the path to misery.

"Key of David" was a name given to the risen Christ in Revelation 3:7 and celebrated that Jesus was God's Messiah or special, chosen one, who would reconnect us to God when we were separated from God. Think (or talk) about times when you feel cut off

from God and how you have gotten reconnected.

O come, O Dayspring, come and cheer our spirits by your advent here; love stir within the womb of night, and death's own shadows put to flight.

Dayspring was an old-fashioned way of meaning "new dawn" which is part of the song of Zechariah in Luke 1:78. Zechariah sang this song to his infant son, John the Baptist, imagining some of the things that Jesus would do. This new dawn would bring about God's mercy, bringing new life, love, and joy upon the earth. How has the birth of Jesus brought joy into your life?

O come, Desire of nations, bind in one the hearts of humankind; O bid our bitter conflict cease, and be for us our Prince of Peace.

The prophet Isaiah spoke of a Prince of Peace (9:6) who would come and bring justice and righteousness. Matthew understood that Jesus was this person, and while we do not know if this is who Isaiah meant or not, we do know that the things Jesus taught can help the world to live in peace. How can you help to bring peace in the world?

Emmanuel is one of the names of Jesus (see Mt 1:23). It is sometimes spelled "Immanuel." This is because the word comes from Hebrew, and was originally written in the Hebrew alphabet. It means "God with us" and can be spelled either way.

Friendship Trip 13 Trip Report

September 24-October 4, 2008

FORO Friendship Trip 13 occurred almost exactly six years following the first FORO Friendship trip in September, 2002. Trip 13 revealed significant changes in the orphanages and Russia which require FORO to critically assess its path forward. My overall conclusions are as follows:

- With some exceptions, the economic challenges facing the orphanages are much less acute than they were several years ago, and the need for material aid is less significant.
- The systemic and deep-rooted challenges facing orphans in general are still present and are more difficult to address.
- The changes observed in Russia validate FORO's strategic direction to concentrate efforts on programs that will have a more personal impact on the lives of the children.
- FORO should scale back its work at certain locations and concentrate its efforts on the programs and locations where it may be better able to have an impact.
- FORO has established warm relations with many individuals and orphanages and the mere fact that FORO has not forgotten them (as was mentioned in

various locations) is meaningful. Children in the orphanages have a greater opportunity for family life today than in years past due to the emphasis on local Russian

emphasis on local Russian adoption and foster care promoted by economic incentives, but this system is still evolving and during this period of change various negative effects have been and continue to occur as well.

- FORO has been greatly blessed by the fact that Sara Harris has become our Russia based facilitator. Sara is efficient, organized, astute and credible with the orphanage directors and officials with whom we met. This assistance will be invaluable as we proceed.

Observations...

Hanging of the Greens

A common Advent tradition in the northern hemisphere is known as the Hanging of the Greens. This is an intriguing blend of ancient symbolisms adapted over the years to proclaim a variety of powerful messages.

Ancient Romans used evergreens as symbols of peace, joy, and victory. Their long-lasting color and inherent strength suggested long life and exuberance. Early Christians saw in these same branches a symbol of the risen Christ, and would place evergreen boughs in their windows to symbolize that Christ was present in their home. However, some early Christian leaders condemned the practice, believing that it was too similar to Roman imperial customs.

The peoples of Northern Europe had many customs connected with evergreens in wintertime the before Christianity arrived there. In a land of long, cold winters, there was a fear that the sun would disappear and never return. Believing that evergreens held magical powers, people brought them indoors hoping they would help bring back the sun. Over time, the evergreens came to symbolize the presence of

new life of Christ, whose birth was celebrated in the northern winter.

Holly became closely tied to Christmas and Christian symbolism. Some people saw it as a symbolic "burning bush" arriving at the time of year when we celebrated the birth of Jesus, the "new Moses." Others saw it as a symbol of Mary whose being glowed with the presence of the Holy Spirit symbolized by the color red. Still others saw its prickly leaves and red berries as symbols of the crown of thorns and drops of blood. Lest we get carried away in a story of pure joy, the holly tree reminds us of a larger picture.

Cedar in many cultures is a symbol of royalty, and the sweet smell of pine and other evergreens is a reminder of the frankincense brought by the magi.

As churches, homes, and other places get adorned with greenery during Advent and Christmas, look beyond the decorations to the powerful symbolism that can take us ever deeper into the story and mystery that is the birth of Jesus Christ in our world.

Dear Friends,

Since our daughter died this summer I have had a number of people ask me how doing. It is a difficult we are question and I often pass over it replying that we are fine. bv You know, I lie like we Christians are taught. Sometimes I reveal a little bit more of my inner self by saying that I am partially alright. The truth is that you can really know how I am doing by looking at my hands.

As we approach the holidays Carrie's absence from my life is devastating. She was the one that helped me tool up for the season. She loved the gatherings, the shopping, the planning, the cooking and the decorating. There isn't a single part of our family planning and gathering that doesn't cry out, "Where is Carrie?" Her absence has left an unbearable hole in my soul. The holidays make it so obvious.

My relationship with God is affected by this hole. Joy seems fleeting, peace is unknown. Sometimes I read where God answered someone's prayers and I distance myself from God who said "no" to my prayers. I wonder why we were not worthy of God's healing. Anger is my constant companion and if I have too much time to myself I question the point and meaning of everything. My passion for life is gone and I feel like a robot just trying to do the right thing. Like Wesley, I try to do good and do no harm.

When you think like this it is easy to drift into unhealthy God thoughts. We in the church call God thinking, theology. Out of the darkness of this hole in my soul comes a lot of bad theology. I think that prayer doesn't work. God doesn't care. Life is meaningless. It amazes me how often Satan whispers something in my ear and suddenly I question everything that I have preached about for thirty years. But you will never understand the intensity of this theological struggle unless you look at my hands.

My hands are full of splinters. They are there because of how tightly I am hanging on to the cross of Calvary. Each time I hear a whisper that says "God doesn't really care" I hold a little tighter to the old rugged cross. It is here, at the foot of the cross. God made it plain that He does love me. And it is here I cling with all my strength. There is an old Hebrew phrase used in one of their celebrations where they say "Davenu" which means, "It is enough." I say that a lot now. For if God would do nothing else for me, like answer my prayers, the fact that Jesus died for my sin is enough. Davenu. It is here I stand, or more to the fact, here I cling. Trusting in what I no longer feel. Believing in what is no longer evident. I keep trying to look through the darkness of this hole in my soul to see the face of Jesus hanging on that cross looking down at me saying, "This is how much I love you." In that old rugged cross, stained with blood so divine a wondrous

beauty I see. For 'twas on that old cross Jesus suffered and died, to pardon and sanctify me. So I'll cherish the old rugged cross, till my trophies at last I lay down; I will cling to the old rugged cross and exchange it someday for a crown.

I share all this because I know that others hurt just like me and I am not alone in this struggle of faith. Your holidays are also affected by a dark hole. I hope by sharing my story we can encourage one another to hang in there. Hold on brothers! Hold on sisters! One day we will take our splintered hands and place them in the hands scarred by nails. So, hold on!
