# Ash Wednesday

### Ash Wednesday

The Season of Lent begins with Ash Wednesday, 46 days before Easter. (The six Sundays that fall during the 40 days of Lent stretch the season out a little.) The date of Ash Wednesday is always determined by the date of Easter. This year, because Easter is so very early (March 23), Ash Wednesday falls on February 6.

An ancient tradition for this day is to burn palm branches from the previous Palm Sunday and to use these ashes to make the sign of the cross on the forehead or the back of the hand. This is a symbolic way of saying "I'm sorry," a tradition that began long ago. When people had done something wrong, they would cover themselves with ashes to show that they were sorry and wanted to change.

Sometimes the ashes are mixed with oil, which is a sign of healing and blessing. This reminds us that when we ask God for forgiveness, God helps us turn our lives around and start again.





### **One Hour: What's It Worth?**

There's a saying that goes, "You can give without loving, but you can't love without giving."

During the seasons of Lent and Easter as we think about Jesus dying on the cross and

rising from the tomb, we give thanks to God for the gift of new life that we receive through Jesus Christ. Many churches take special offerings or provide opportunities for people to "give something back" to God by sharing with others during Lent. When we give to others it is a way of saying thank you to God.

In 1946, Bishop Henry Knox Sherrill of the Episcopal Church in the United States put out an appeal on the radio for people to raise a million dollars in one hour, and they were successful. Over the next few years this idea spread, and the result was a Lenten offering program in which several denominations participate called One Great Hour of Sharing. While the practice varies from church to church, in most cases the money goes to help in places experiencing natural disasters, both in the US and overseas.

It gives one reason to reflect: what is an hour worth? What can we do with one hour? As you prepare for the spiritual journey of Lent, think about "one hour" and explore what it can mean. Here are some suggestions; use your imagination to come up with others.

- If you work for pay, can you donate one hour's wages or salary to the church or another cause?
- If you do not work for pay, calculate what an hour of your time might be worth and consider donating that.
- Give an hour of your time to someone else, each day or week of Lent.
- Spend less time at work and more time with a loved one.
- Do more things as a couple or a family or with friends.

- Spend an hour helping a neighbor or someone who is homebound.
- Volunteer somewhere for an hour.
- Spend an hour in silence. Pray, meditate, wonder. Go outside, whether in the country or the city, and listen to the sounds around you. What do you hear that you have not heard before? Pray for the people and situations that come to mind as you listen.
- Turn off the television, computer, video games, or whatever your favorite pastime is. Do something different for an hour each day. Read. Sing. Play a game. Have a conversation. Exercise.
- Spend an hour a day making something, or working on a project – something that can be shared with someone else.



#### **ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL REPORT**

As we begin the year 2008 we strive for new beginnings, new ways to serve our Lord. At our Administrative Council meeting on January 14<sup>th</sup>, we began the New Year by restructuring our meetings. The council meetings will now focus on forward-looking activities as well as revisiting where we have been. The first half of the meeting will be used to set goals for our church and to develop leadership techniques. Our committees will be asked to focus on goals based upon the overall vision of St. Paul's Church. The second half of the meeting will be used by committee chairpersons to summarize their committee's activities in the previous month.

Pastor Ruth will be presiding over a 10- part leadership training study entitled "Leadership From the Heart". This study will take place over three Sunday afternoons in late February and March. The study will focus on servant-leadership based upon utilizing our spiritual gifts. All committee members and leaders within our church are encouraged to signup for this leadership study.

Corinne Piper handed out summaries of our Dot-Sunday results from a few years ago to our committee chairpersons. Our chairpersons are asked to review the summaries within their committees and focus on which goals have been accomplished and which goals still need to be implemented, according to the overall vision of our church.

Norm Grigsby reported that the contractor working on our fellowship hall is nearing completion and was given a punch-list of unfinished items to complete. In January and February, the fellowship hall will be painted and prepared for installation of the floor, ceiling and lighting. Ron Steiner is organizing workers from our congregation to do the prep work. A *Fellowship Hall Utilization Committee* will meet at 7PM on January 29<sup>th</sup> to discuss how our new, renovated fellowship hall will be used and to discuss what equipment and appurtenances may be needed for its intended uses. Anyone wishing to attend the meeting is welcome.

It was noted in council that there will be a Northwest Plains (Continued on page 13)



### LEADERSHIP FROM THE HEART

The Administrative Council will be holding a training for current and future leaders in the church. You are invited to join the Administrative Council for "Leadership From the Heart: Learning to Lead with Love and Skill", by Carol Cartmill and Yvonne Gentile, from the Church of the Resurrection, in Leawood, KS.

This is a study designed for lay people in servant leadership. It is biblically based, spiritually focused, and service oriented. The study will be held on three Sunday afternoons: February 3, February 17, and March 2, from 1:00 to 4:30 PM.

The Administrative Council members are expected to attend; members of committees are encouraged to attend; and anyone else interested is invited to attend.

We are asking that anyone who will be attending these sessions call the church office to let us know that you will be there, and whether you wish to purchase the book at \$11 each. A sack lunch is recommended, and snacks will be provided.

### CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

There have been many great opportunities at St. Paul's Church for increasing your knowledge of God's Word and living a life to reflect that over the last few months. Shirley Moser has been sharing her love of God with preschoolers, Janna Thompson and Gail Fessler have been working with the elementary children and a team of teachers (Steve and Tracey Sdao, Vicki McAdams and Jan Wyant) have been guiding the middle school and high school students during the Education hour every Sunday.

Another team of workers have been caring for the younger worshippers during the Worship service. Various volunteers have staffed the nursery and Slone Nagy, Angie and Brian Nartker, and Corinne Piper have alternated weeks of the Children's Worship program. Currently the children's worship group is learning about the seasons of the church.

The adults have been learning also with various topics in two different Adult Classes, open to anyone in the church. They have grown through studies of other denominations, living our faith at our workplaces and learning about the calling from God to marriage and understanding and celebrating the differences between men and women.

We invited all members to join us in one of the classes and to invite friends to come with them. Groups like these help entice people into the doors of our church home without the formality of worship services. Share the fun!

#### TRUSTEE MEETING

The Board of Trustees met for the first time in 2008 on January 8 with Jamie Wyant as the new Chairman. The first order of business was to meet with Ron Steiner to discuss some of the needs of the basement renovation. During our discussion it was decided to place new table and chair racks in the old basement to conserve space and yet still have easy access. The committee considered this a good location since we now use plastic tables that are more easily moved.

The Trustees also discussed repairs to the roof over the Narthex and the bell tower. Those have both been temporarily repaired and will have more permanent repairs in the Spring. Due to the difficulty in locating bricks to match the Parsonage, temporary steps were installed for the front porch. We hope to find matching bricks in the Spring and have them laid so the concrete steps can be poured.

### IHS

"Pastor," the woman said, "isn't it time to put the 'I Have Suffered' on the altar?"

The minister looked at the woman with a puzzled look, not quite sure at all what she was referring to.

"You know, the green cloth with the letters IHS on it – the 'I Have Suffered.""

A light bulb went off for the minister, who wanted immediately to correct the devoted church member, but then thought better of it, and simply nodded.

The letters IHS sometimes appear on altar cloths, stained glass windows, clergy vestments, and numerous other places associated with Christians. What do they stand for?

There are a couple of "official" answers. The most commonly accepted is that they represent the Greek letters *iota*, *eta*, and *sigma*, the first three letters of the name Jesus in Greek.

Another explanation, which makes sense in those instances where the letters are separated by periods, is that they are the first letters of the Latin words *Iesu Hominum Salvator*, meaning "Jesus, Savior of Humankind." There are several other understandings, including "In His Service." Most important of all, the letters are a symbol, and symbols by their very nature can have many meanings, just as God is experienced and understood in many ways.

#### OUR CORPORATE PRAYERS OF INTERCESSION

#### Joys and Concerns vs. Bidding Prayers

Some have asked me why we have 'bidding' prayers instead of 'joys and concerns' in our worship time. There have also been questions about when to lift up particular types of concerns in the bidding prayer format. So, this article will hopefully clarify some of these concerns.

In the past, I freely and openly accepted joys and concerns in worship. I felt it was a way that we as a congregation could share our burdens and celebrate our successes with one another. However, experience has taught me that this isn't necessarily the best vehicle for expressing prayers.

I value every person's privacy and, having come from a professional discipline where confidentiality was a very high ethic, I continue to function with that ethic. That ethic continues to guide how I order what I do in the church and in the life of the church. I also believe that there is a theology of prayer that says God will work even when we don't know the details. Our work is just to lift the needs up and give it over to God.

#### Joys and Concerns

I've had good, well meaning members of the congregations I've served share details of surgeries, details of marital problems of friends or relatives, personal struggles of addictions of people they knew, and other things in the Joys and Concerns format. On two occasions, I did follow up visits in these situations, and was told in no uncertain terms that the persons did not appreciate that the information was shared. In other instances, I have found out that the information was incorrect.

Now, we can set parameters around what we lift up in a 'joys and concerns' format in worship, and people would try to adhere to the rules. However, experience has also taught me that sometimes, we will have a visitor who doesn't know the rules, or someone will feel a need to give details anyway.

While hearing corporate joys and concerns can be healing for members of the congregation, there are times when it can be damaging if information is shared, as well meaning as it is, when permission hasn't been given, and when people value their privacy.

One final concern about joys and concerns. I've also experienced where the occasional concern was lifted up that was of a personal

nature, and it ended up being the topic of gossip. Prayer is not about passing along the latest Intercessory prayer is news. about lifting up persons to God for healing, for care, for comfort, and for support. Our response is never to be one of passing along information, but of responding in love and outreach to the person Too often, though, affected. these joys and concerns end up being a vehicle of sharing While that may not gossip. have happened in this congregation, the danger of it happening outweighs the desire of this pastor to have such corporate joys and concerns prayers.

For those who like this type of prayer, I would suggest you make joys and concerns a part of your gatherings in your smaller groups or in your family, where your group can then plan the needed outreach to individuals named. If you are interested in praying for people in the church, use the prayer list in the bulletin each week. You don't have to know all the details. o r e v e n relationships. God knows, and God will know your heart as you pray over this list.

### Lent: What to Do, What

#### Not to Do...

In times gone by, people would ask the question, "What are you giving up for Lent?" The practice – and thus the question – is not so commonplace any more.

The idea of giving something up for Lent had to do with Christians sharing in the suffering of Christ during this season, as we prepared for Good Friday and Easter. In some ways the Season of Lent replicates Jesus' journey into the desert where he fasted for 40 days, and so going without in this season was a sort of parallel activity. However, as character Rev. Clare Fergusson points out in the novel <u>Out of the Deep I Cry</u>, "When you have an abundance of something, giving up a little bit of it isn't meaningful."

Some people go without sweets or eat simpler meals and, in so doing, experience an important spiritual discipline. But many Christians have looked to the roots of the ancient practice of fasting – which was to bring one closer to God – and sought out other ways to try to achieve this in this holy season.

How might you "step out of the ordinary" and journey a little more closely with God during Lent? Perhaps by taking a little more time in prayer and meditation each day. Maybe by reaching out in service to others, by volunteering some time on a regular basis, or reading to children at the local library, serving meals at a shelter, or cleaning up the roadside.

Perhaps someone who lives a

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stressful life might choose to take on a fun activity each day of Lent. This is hardly a traditional way to experience the season, but it is something that could help them to grow spiritually.

It doesn't matter what we do, so much as the fact that we do something that might help us find ourselves changed, even just a little, when we arrive on the doorstep of Holy Week. Be ready to be transformed again by this most amazing story of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection.
