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
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
SAINTS AND SINNERS

Among the saints whose feast days are celebrated in the month of July, a couple stand out in particular – St. Thomas (July 3) and St. Mary Magdalene (July 22) – and remind me of a poem I learned years ago. The words are a bit corny, and the rhymes are forced, but the message is strong:

St. Matthew was a taxman;
St. Dismas was a thief;
Mary Magdalene had demons;
Tom was without belief.
Yet there they are in heaven,
looking down upon us now,
holding up their holy hands
to their tired and weary brow.
So the sins of all us sinners
don't necessarily condemn:
your wasness doesn't matter,





Come join us on a five day mission trip to Church World Service Center in New Windsor, Maryland

An Old-Fashioned Love Song

A love song? In the Bible? Gently squeezed in between Ecclesiastes and Isaiah we find the Song of Solomon. This obscure little book provides an optional lectionary reading for July 6, 2008, and is often referred to by its Hebrew title "Song of Songs" or "The Song to End All Songs."

Grab a glass of lemonade, sit in the shade, and give it a read. Try it in a paraphrase such as *The Message* or a readable translation such as *Today's New*

International Version or the *New Jerusalem Bible*. Let the romantic poetry take you away to a place of carefree lovers whose passion for each other is boundless.

While not exactly x-rated – certainly not by today's standards – the book is quite erotic in places. The fact that it never mentions God causes some to question its place in the Bible. Yet, through its celebration of the beauty and wholeness of human relationships, it appears to praise God's infinite wisdom in creating the gift of love and intimacy.

Because of this, over the

centuries some have tried to see in this book a symbolism of God's love for humankind, or of Christ's love for the church. In doing so, certainly attempts were made to divert people's attention from the Song's affirmation of human sexuality. Yet in a world where, as one scholar puts it "specializes in loveless sex" a book that reminds us that God created sex as part of loving relationships may be just what we need.



REPORT ON WEST OHIO UMC CONFERENCE — PROGRAMS AND SPEAKERS

I am glad that I had the opportunity of representing you at annual conference this year. This was a new, enlightening, awesome experience. The worship times were memorable with both the settings and the content. The theme of **Love First** was woven into all of the days. In addition to the teaching times, there were ministry minutes, reports, legislative consideration and voting on the Recommendations, Celebration of Retirement and Credentialing Service, meeting new people, and finding a little time to spend with old friends. (Laity and clergy, such as Rev. Terry Heck)

Before we left, Pastor Ruth had announced the study she is giving, starting in July. Imagine my surprise when on the first full day, Monday, there was a presentation “Three Simple Rules,” by Bishop Rueben Job. So we heard how he came to write this “little” book, his vision, and how he hoped it would help. He wanted to put it in our contemporary language; to be a lean, accessible and able-to-be-read “on the run” book. In a very descriptive illustration, he spoke of the danger of putting a label on another person – how that puts them in a lock and puts a log in our own eyes and we fail to see that person and their God-given gifts and blessings.



Bishop Rueben P. Job is a retired bishop of the United Methodist Church and one of the outstanding leaders in spiritual formation within the church. Bishop Job served as a bishop in the Iowa area, as the world editor of the *Upper Room* and as associate general secretary of the board of discipleship -- as well as being a pastor, chaplain, district superintendent, and conference staff person. He is the author of numerous books, including *A Guide to Prayer for Ministers and Other Servants*, *A Guide to Spiritual Discernment*, and *Three Simple Rules*.

One of the churches of the conference provided the funds to purchase enough of Bishop Job’s book, *Three Simple Rules*, for each person present. Bishop Job autographed as many of our books as he was able to do. I was one of the fortunate, and he signed my copy. Since meeting this dedicated man, I am really looking forward to our study on this book in July.

Consulting the Manual

Sowing Seeds



On two of the four Sundays in July, the gospel readings in the lectionary are parables about planting seeds. Both stories carry many meanings.

In Matthew 13:1-9, 18-23 (July 13) Jesus tells about someone planting seeds that fall on different kinds of soil. Some fall on the path and don't take root; some fall on rocky ground and get scorched by the sun; some get choked by thorns; and some fall on good soil and yield lots of grain. Later on, Jesus explains to the disciples that the different kinds of soil stand for different kinds of people: some hear the word of God and welcome it, and others do not.

The story also reminds us that God's word – the message of God's love – gets spread all around for everyone to hear.

In Matthew 13:24-30, 36-43 (July 20) Jesus tells another parable about someone planting wheat in a field. Another person came along and planted weeds, and as they grew, no one could tell which were which. The workers wanted to pull the weeds, but the landowner said, "No. We might pull up the wheat by mistake. We need to wait."

This story reminds us that we are not to judge who is a good person and who is not; that is for God to do.

Neither story is really about planting – Jesus simply used that example to teach something else.

Report from West Ohio UMC Conference



Recommendations by *Lavonne Segovia*

The picture above is of Pastor Ruth, on her transport vehicle of choice, between sessions. I used the shuttle golf carts to get to and from Hoover Auditorium. There were approximately 2500-2550 clergy and laity who attended the conference.

The Recommendation, Reports, Nominations and Announcements were worked on and brought to the body of the conference as scheduled and as time allowed during the various sessions of the conference. In total there were 17 recommendations. Each was presented, discussed (for and against) and amended, then sometimes amendments to the amendment and substitutions were made. These were presided over by Bishop Ough. He was admirable in keeping us focused on where we were in the parliamentary rules and just what part we were voting on. Eventually we made our way through each one.

#1 Recommendation was on Connectional Ministries Council/Structural Alignment Task Force. It would bring various ministries, commissions, and concern groups into 6 teams. (1. Let Justice Roll 2. Telling the Story 3. Next Generation Leadership 4. Disciple Making Churches 5. Inclusive Body of Christ 6. Spirit Empowered Leaders.) This was passed with minimal amendment.

#2 Recommendation was on Finance and Administration for 2009. This was approved with minimal amendment.

#3 Recommendation was on the Episcopacy Residence Committee report; for need of new residence for Bishop and to follow guide lines and standards for residence. This was eventually passed with amendment which lowered the upper limit of spending.

#4 Recommendation was concerned with New Church Start/Satellite and calculating parent church and new church/satellite apportionments. This was passed

#5 Recommendation was on Equitable Compensation for ministries. This was approved

#6 Recommendation was on Care for Creation: Local Church Response. Approved and to be put on agenda of Let Justice Roll Team.

#7 Resolution as on Advocacy Regarding Care of Creation. This was approved with minimal changes.

#8 Resolution - Against Gambling in Ohio. This was approved as amended

#9 Recommendation on Pension and Health Benefits – This was approved.

#10 Resolution - on the Central Conference Pension Initiative. This was passed as amended.

#11 Recommendation – Words Have Consequences – A lot was discussed and then this was tabled.

#12 Recommendation Read, Study, Learn – struggle to find principles for applying traditional teachings to contemporary understandings of human sexuality. The original was not approved, but a substitute was passed.

#13 Recommendation - Sexual Relations of all Persons. This was also tabled.

#14 Recommendation – is a Vision/Mission Statement on Diversity and Inclusion.

#15 Recommendation –Conference-wide Workers Compensation – There are changes in here that help with coverage for pastors and should decrease the local church cost. This was approved.

#16 Resolution – Response to Immigration and Customs Enforcement{ICE} Raids and Detention. This was passed.

#17 Resolution – Objectionable TV such as Swingtown on CBS. There was a lot of discussion on the best way to confront this. The youth at conference brought and thoughtfully defended a Substitute and the amended Substitute was approved.

The full content of these as amended or substituted should be available later on the web site and in the updated Discipline. Working through these legislative items was time consuming, but I was impressed with the genuine concern for what was God's will and clarification on wording for the best understanding and how individuals brought well thought-out pro and con statements.

Pastor Rudy Rasmus is an urban prophet. For 15 years he has led the St. John's United Methodist Church with his wife Juanita. In this brief span of time, the couple has transformed the spiritual landscape and the face of poverty in Downtown Houston. Beginning with 9 existing members in 1992, St. John's has grown to over 9,000 members (3,000 of the total either are or were formerly homeless) in fifteen years into one of the most culturally diverse congregations in the country where every week people of every social and economic background share the same pew. They attribute the success of the church to a compassionate congregation who has embraced the vision of tearing down the walls of classism, sexism, and racism and building the bridges of unconditional love, and universal recovery.

In Rev. Rasmus's first teaching session he used the story of Jesus and the woman at the well in Samaria. He challenged us to recognize our own "Samaria" – places we do not go; to do as Jesus did and take God's love with us. Despite the circumstances of "someone's" life, they need to know God's Love.

In his second teaching session he used the story of the man at the pool near the Sheep's Gate at Bethesda, who lay by the pool for 38 years trying to be healed, but no one helped him in to the water when it was stirred. He compared the water to truth. We can be around the pool looking at truth, but are unable to get *into* the truth. If we wait for people in need to come to us, instead of going out to look for them, no one will get well.

If you look at Rev Rasmus's picture you will note that he has a beard done in a special way. He first called attention to his beard saying, "You know someone is wondering what in the world is that?" He said it was a filter which helps keep judgmental people at a distance. Think about that explanation!! I could go on, but you get the idea. There were many stimulating talks and much inspirational music.

Report from West Ohio UMC Conference

Report on Giving as Lay Delegate to Annual West Ohio UMC Conference in Lakeside.



One of my first responsibilities was to deliver the Love offering to conference for the special Miracle Offering. In keeping with the **Love First** theme, there was a **Love First Offering** (Miracle Offering) at the 2008 Annual Conference session. Our church, St. Paul UMC of Elida, sent its Easter Offering, for our part of this offering. The above picture is of this collection, into one of the nets (for Africa), at the Tuesday morning service.

In the fall of 2006, The United Methodist Church formed a partnership with the magazine Sports Illustrated, the National Basketball Foundation, the United Nations Foundation and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation to form Nothing But Nets – a campaign to eradicate malaria. The primary way to save persons from malaria in poverty stricken areas is to be sure they sleep under a chemically-treated mosquito net during the evening hours when the malaria-bearing mosquitoes are active. The principle behind this campaign is simple and straightforward – “**send a net, save a life.**”

The United Methodist Church is growing rapidly in Southeast Asia, particularly in Cambodia and Vietnam. There are now over 150 congregations in Cambodia and 35 in Vietnam. Our goal is to raise money to support the exciting and life-transforming work underway in Cambodia and Vietnam.

Unless otherwise designated, 1/3 of the offering will be allocated to Nothing But Nets and 2/3 to Cambodia and Vietnam.



The picture above is of Esther & Nicholas Gitobu, who are missionaries to Cambodia. They were at the conference with their family. Based in Cambodia, his responsibilities will include oversight of receipts and disbursements of GBGM funds for projects and personnel. “**My role is to work together with others to correctly interpret policy, and to facilitate and encourage accountability and stewardship which will firmly build the body of Christ—the Church,**” Nicholas explains. “**I truly believe, [this] is God’s way of giving me yet another opportunity to serve Him while serving others.**”

Celebrations & Connecting



Also at conference were missionaries to Vietnam, Karen & Ut Vo-To. The Rev. Karen Vo-To is a missionary of the General Board of Global Ministries of the United Methodist Church assigned to Southeast Asia, along with her husband, Rev. Ut To, who is also a GBGM missionary.

Karen's work especially focuses on recruiting women to study for pastoral ministry. She is establishing a women's support group to encourage them to **“reach their full potential in Jesus Christ; to promote fellowship among women at the national level; to provide vehicles of communication for women, listening to and offering solutions for the women's needs; and to present the whole gospel to the whole person,”** she says.

Ut trains Christian leaders in developing new congregations and nurturing Christians in the region. **“I believe that through my teaching and example, I will prepare students for their future work as preachers, teachers, and pastors,”** he says, **“and through my witness many new congregations will be established.”**

It was good to meet and speak to these persons to whom we are giving support and to hear what is being accomplished through our giving. On Thursday, the latest count of the giving was \$284,017 from offerings and challenges. For some of the giving, matching funds were donated; this giving added another \$150,000, for a total of \$434,017, exceeding the pre-conference goal. Updates, final total, and designations of funds are to be posted on the conference web site.



Featured Recipes from St. Paul's Cookbook

Blueberry Salad

Ingredients		Instructions



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
