




Until next month, I'll see you in the mission field.

The Big "D" Word In Prayer

Thoughts based on Intimate Intercession by Tricia McCrary Rhodes

Well, how did you do last month on being disciplined in your prayer life; at just sitting at God's feet? I did a lousy job of it! It was a busy, unpredictable month and, truthfully, I just didn't feel like being disciplined in my prayer life. I ask for forgiveness from God on this and I feel guilty—again—about my inability to practice what I hope for.

For Rhodes "the question is not whether we need discipline, but how we can know whether we're grinding something out in our own strength or whether the work we're investing is, as Paul put it, "the grace of God with me". That doesn't mean we can just wait for inspiration to hit us to pray, although that does happen sometimes. But it can happen more easily when we give God some space to get into our heads.

I also have trouble staying with it because I can't see instant results. It's like when I eat healthy for one meal or do one push-up and think I should lose 10 pounds in a day. It's hard to stay disciplined when I don't see or feel anything happening. It's also discouraging.

This is where Rhodes suggests we need to change our focus. Rather than focus on "gettin' it done" we should focus on knowing Jesus more intimately and making Him known with three questions:

- 1. "Am I motivated by joy?" Not by the hope of high elation but "for the joy set before us, we're willing to do what it takes."
- 2. "Am I spurred on by love?" Have we lost our sense of wonder at God's love for all creation?
- 3. "Am I relishing my relationship as a needy child with the heavenly Father?" We need to remember that God doesn't blame us for being weak. He wants us to go to Him for help.

Instead of beating ourselves up for being human, we should ask God for help in being more like Him. We should ask for help in continuing our walk. St. Benedict taught his monks that we will fail, BUT we can always begin again and again and again....

Begin again with me on Sunday mornings at 9:30 a.m. in the Prayer Room (former Bride's Room) to list those on our prayer list by name and listen to God's heart regarding their needs.



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Hymn History

Praise God, from Whom All Blessings Flow

"Then Sings My Soul" Book 1, By Robert J. Morgan

1674

Blessed be the God and father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places in Christ. Ephesians 1:3

Before Charles Wesley or Isaac Watts, there was Thomas Ken who has been called "England's first hymnist." He was born in 1637 in Little Berkhampstead on the fringes of greater London. When his parents died, he was raised by his half-sister and her husband who enrolled him in Winchester College, an historic boys' school. Thomas was later ordained to the ministry and returned to Winchester as a chaplain.

To encourage the devotional habits of the boys, Thomas wrote three hymns in 1674. This was revolutionary because English hymns had not yet appeared. Only the Psalms were sung in public worship. Ken suggested the boys use the hymns privately in their rooms.

One hymn was to be sung upon waking, another at bedtime, and a third at midnight if sleep didn't come. His morning hymn had 13 stanzas, beginning with:

Awake, my soul, and with the sun thy daily stage of duty run; Shake off dull sloth and joyful rise, to pay thy morning sacrifice.

His evening hymn, equally meaningful, include this verse:

All praise to thee, my God, this night, for all the blessings of the light! Keep me, O keep me, King of kings, beneath thine own almighty wings.

All three hymns ended with a common stanza, which has since become the most widely-sung verse in the world.

Praise God, from Whom all blessings flow; / Praise Him, all creatures here below; / Praise Him above, ye heavenly host; / praise Father; Son, and Holy Ghost.

In 1680, Thomas was appointed Chaplain to England's King Charles II. It was a thankless job, as Charles kept a variety of mistresses. Once the king asked to lodge a mistress in the chaplain's residence. Thomas rebuked him, saying, "Not for the King's Kingdom!" Afterward the king referred to him as "that little man who refused lodging to poor Nellie."

During the reign of the next king, James II, Thomas, by now a bishop, was sent to the Tower of London for his Protestant convictions. After his release, Thomas retired to the home of a wealthy friend where he died on March 11, 1711. He was buried at sunrise, and the Doxology was sung at his funeral.



Methodist History

Francis Asbury

August 1745– March 1816

One of the first bishops of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the United States.

When the American Revolutionary War broke out in 1776, Francis Asbury and James Dempster were the only British Methodist ministers to remain in America. Francis Asbury began to be looked upon as the leader of the groups since James dempster, who moved to upstate New York, was greatly restricted because, as an Englishman, he was suspected of not being sympathetic to the patriot cause. Dempster ceased his circuit riding and stayed with his friend, Judge Thomas White of Delaware. By the war's end, Francis Asbury retained his credibility with the victorious Americans and was able to continue his ministry among them.


During his early years in North America, Asbury devoted his attention mainly to followers living on the eastern shore between the Delaware River and the Chesapeake Bay. When the American revolution severed the traditional ties between the American Thirteen Colonies and Great Britain, Asbury, in the interest of his religious tenets and principles and in an attempt to remain aloof from the political and military fervor that swept the country, announced he would, to keep the embryonic Methodist congregations neutral, refrain from endorsing either Great Britain or the newly formed United States of America government, and urged all his followers to do the same. This request placed almost all of his followers, especially those living in Maryland, in an untenable position. The State of Maryland had enacted a law requiring all citizens to take an Oath of Allegiance to the newly formed American Congress. In addition to this, it stipulated all non-residents within its boundaries also had to take and sign an Oath of Allegiance. Francis Asbury, after proclaiming his neutrality, fled to Delaware, where taking an oath of allegiance was not a requirement. His adherents in Maryland suffered the rancor of the proponents of the Oath.

Asbury remained hidden during the war and ventured occasionally back into Maryland. Sometimes this had the effect of compromising his parishioners.

In 1780, Asbury met the freedman Henry "Black Harry" Hosier, a meeting the minister believed "providentially arranged". Hosier served as his driver and guide and, though illiterate, memorized long passages of the Bible as Asbury read them aloud during their travels. Hosier eventually became a famous preacher in his own right, the first African American to preach directly to a white congregation in the United States.

Sunnydale House

Please unwrap all the items in the kits with the exception of the soap and toothbrushes.

The average cost for each kit is \$15. If you are unable to shop for these items yourself, consider donating \$15 plus \$2.00 for shipping per kit and we will do the shopping for you, but these donations must be in **by Aug 24** so we can do the shopping. See me or put the money in a separate envelope marked "kits" in the collection tray.

All kits are due by **September 5.**

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
