

Hymn History

Jesus, Lover of My Soul

"Then Sings My Soul" Book 1, By Robert J. Morgan

1740

For He Himself has said, "I will never leave you or forsake you." So we may boldly say: "The Lord is my helper; I will not fear. What can man do to me?" Hebrews 13:5b-6

Many stories have arisen around the writing of "Jesus, Lover of My Soul," but they all appear to be fictional. We don't know the exact occasion for his composition, but it was written shortly after Charles Wesley's conversion, and it's words seem to anticipate the huge crowds, lawless mobs, midnight escapes, traveling dangers, and flea infested beds he would encounter in coming years. Wesley's life, in brief, can be summoned up as follows:

As the methodist movement spread through England, Charles traveled horseback from place to place, an itinerant, homeless evangelist. His fiery preaching incited revival in some people and outrage in others.


In the midst of all of this, his dear mother, Susanna, died on July 23, 1742. her last words were, "Children, as soon as I am released, sing a psalm of praise to God." Later, preaching in Wales, "Charles met Sally Gwynne, a beautiful girl half his age. A courtship followed, and Charles wanted to propose, but he was virtually penniless with no way of supporting a wife.

That's when he decided to publish his *Hymns and Sacred Poems*, as well as his journals and sermons, hoping the royalties would provide an income. Charles and Sally were married on April 8, 1749, Charles noting: "Not a cloud was to be seen from morning till night. I rose at four, spent three hours and a half in prayer or singing with my brother...At eight I led my Sally to church... It was a most solemn season of love!"

They left immediately on a preaching tour, and Charles continued his itinerant ministry until 1756, when at age 49, exhausted, he and Sally settled down. Charles busied himself preaching, visiting, counseling, fretting about his three unsaved children, trying to keep Methodism within the Church of England, and giving unsolicited advice to his brother, John. All the while, he worked tirelessly on his hymns and poems.

By early 1788, Charles was bedfast, not from sickness but from a lifetime of fatigue. By March, too weak to write, he dictated his last hymn to Sally:

In age and feebleness extreme, Who shall a sinful worm redeem? Jesus, my only hope Thou art, strength of my failing flesh and heart; Oh could I catch a smile from Thee, and drop into eternity!



Poem

Glory to God, and Praise and Love

By Charles Wesley, 1739

Glory to God, and praise and love be ever, ever given, by saints below and saints above, the church in earth and heaven.

On this glad day the glorious Sun of Righteousness arose; on my benighted soul he shone and filled it with repose.

Sudden expired the legal strife, 'twas then I ceased to grieve; my second, real, living life I then began to live.

Then with my heart I first believed, believed with faith divine, power with the Holy Ghost received to call the Savior mine.

I felt my Lord's atoning blood close to my soul applied; me, me he loved, the Son of God, for me, for me he died!

I found and owned his promise true, ascertained of my part, my pardon passed in heaven I knew when written on my heart.

O for a thousand tongues to sing my dear redeemer's praise! The glories of my God and king, the triumphs of his grace.

My gracious Master and my God, assist me to proclaim, to spread through all the earth abroad the honors of thy name.

Jesus! the name that charms our fears, that bids our sorrows cease, 'tis music in the sinner's ears, 'tis life, and health, and peace!

He breaks the power of canceled sin, he sets the prisoner free; his blood can make the foulest clean; his blood availed for me.

He speaks and listening to his voice new life the dead receive; the mournful, broken hearts rejoice, the humble poor believe.

Hear him, ye deaf, his praise, ye dumb, your loosened tongues employ; ye blind, behold your savior come, and leap, ye lame, for joy.

Look unto him, ye nations, own your God, ye fallen race!
Look and be saved through faith alone, be justified by grace!


See all your sins on Jesus laid; the lamb of God was slain, his soul was once an offering made for every soul of man.

With me, your chief, you then shall know, Shall feel your sins forgiven; anticipate your heaven below and own that love is heaven.







BRAD JOSEPH MEMORIAL FUND

We would like to extend a big thank you to all of you who attended or helped in any way with the Fifteenth, and Final, Bradley Joseph Memorial Golf Outing. The day did not turn out so great, but I hope everyone had a good time, for a great cause.

We want to congratulate the winning team of Tim Martin, Rick Bible, Dick Long, and Charlie Rayl who shot a 63!!

We also want to thank Daryl and the rest of the staff at Colonial Golfers Club for doing such a great job at hosting our Event and to Mike for that wonderful chicken. And especially the Volunteers who willingly give us their time for this Event!!!

The proceeds from the Outing were \$3,594. Which brings our Outing total to \$58,915, as a result of your generosity, **THANK YOU!!!**

We will be contributing \$2,700 to the Memorial Fund which is held at the Findlay-Hancock County Community Foundation, which will be used to fund future scholarships for Medical Mission Trips.

The other \$894 will be donated to the Bradley Joseph Memorial Camp Scholarship Fund, which is a fund established at the St Paul's UMC to support the camping program at the Church.

The Outing started with a call from Kenny a few weeks after Brad's death that a couple of Brad's fellow pharmacists (Dr. Timothy Burkart and Dr. Ryan Kruse) wanted to start a golf outing in Brad's memory. I told Kenny I was thinking of the same thing and the two doctors and I started talking about how to do this. We had a few meetings in the Spring of 2008 with other family members and had the first golf outing in July at the Bluffton Golf Club. We had 120 golfers!!! We had a wonderful time and decided to continue. The next two were held at Bluffton then we switched to Colonial Golfer's Club. We now have over \$65,000 in the Memorial Fund which will fund many more medical mission scholarships!!!

I thought about putting a list together of all of the participants and volunteers over the years and realized that list would be gigantic!! Thank you to everyone for all of your help in continuing Brad's memory and wonderful work!!!

Creamy Peach Pie



3/4 cup	Sugar	Combine sugar, flour, salt, and nutmeg; add to peaches in bowl and toss lightly.
1/4 cup	All purpose flour	Arrange in pie shell.
1/4 tsp.	Salt	Pour heavy cream over peaches.
· · r ·		Sprinkle with additional nutmeg, if desired.
1/4 tsp	Nutmeg	Bake at 400 degrees for 45 minutes or until set.
4 cups	Peaches, fresh, Peeled, sliced**	Cool well before serving. Garnish with whipped cream, if desired.
1 cup	Heavy cream	Note: Pie pan may be placed on aluminum foil-lined baking sheet.
1 - 9 inch	Pie shell, unbaked	**May use Apples and Cinnamon**

KIDZ KORNER



Use simple ingredients and your imagination to bake these fluffy, cloud-like treats.

What you need:

- · 3 egg whites
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla extract
- Mixer
- · 1 Tbsp. cornstarch
- Parchment paper

What you do:

- Preheat oven to 300°. In a mixing bowl, combine egg whites and vanilla. Mix at medium speed until frothy.
- While whisking, gradually add sugar and cornstarch. Keep whisking at high speed until stiff peaks form.
- Spoon mixture onto a baking sheet lined with parchment paper. Create fun shapes.
- Bake 20 minutes. Cool and enjoy!
