

Hymn History

Go, Tell It on the Mountain

"Then Sings My Soul" Book 2, By Robert J. Morgan

1907

Then the shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all the things that they had heard and seen, as it was told to them. Luke 2:20 (NKJV)

During the bitter days of slavery, black workers on American plantations, solaced themselves with song and created a unique form of American hymnology—the Negro spiritual. It was the jubilee Singers of Fisk University in Nashville, Tennessee, that took the plantation songs of the Negro slaves to the entire world. One of the last "spirituals" to be uncovered and published was this unique Christmas carol, "Go, Tell It on the Mountain."

How did it come about?

John Wesley Work Jr. was born in Nashville, on or about August 6, 1871. His father was a choir director for a Nashville church who often wrote his own arrangements. John grew up singing in his dads choirs, and when he enrolled in Fisk University, he became active in it's music program, though his primary subjects were history and Latin. Returning to Fisk to work on his masters degree, John was eventually hired as professor of Latin and Greek. But his greatest love was the preservation and performance of the Negro Spiritual.


Many of the spirituals had been published, but "Go, Tell It on the Mountain" was largely unknown, though it had been performed by the Jubilee Singers since 1879. Some of the original stanzas were obscure, for spirituals, by definition, were unwritten songs passed from plantation to plantation and from generation to generation. The chorus, however, was crystal clear and highlighted the theme for the whole: "Go, Tell It on the Mountain / Jesus Christ is born."

Intrigued by the chorus and melody, John wrote two stanzas for this song, and it became his custom before sunrise on Christmas morning to take students caroling from building to building, singing, "Go, Tell It on the Mountain." It was first published in 1907in Work's Folk Songs of the Negro as sung on the Plantations.

John Work has been called the first black collector of Negro folk song, a pursuit continued by his two sons. John Wesley Work II and Frederick J. Work. Both young men served on the faculty of Fisk University, working with the Jubilee Singers and collecting and publishing African-American spirituals and folk music.

"Go, Tell It on the Mountain" is a classic in that genre. To black slaves in antebellum America, the birth of a liberating Savior was a message to be heralded from the highest mountains.

It still is, for us all.



Methodist History

Susanna Wesley

In all these years, as well as the years that were to follow, Susanna had need of all her thrift. Her life from marriage to death was a constant struggle against weakness and poverty. One disaster followed another so drearily that a less thoroughly equipped woman would soon have despaired. The hourly tragedy of the lack of food and clothing, and the burden of an ever-increasing family of children, often seemed unbearable. Her 19 children were all born within a period of 20 years.

Her great courage was dominant throughout her life. She never gave up. She never yielded even to the actual disease. She did the work that had to be done, no matter the condition of her body or mind. Her son, John, wrote long afterword of a calm serenity with which his mother transacted business, wrote letters, and conversed surrounded by her 13 children.

Yet, while taking care of her kitchen, she was training her children: times of going to rest, rising in the morning, dressing, eating, learning, and exercising. She managed by rule, which was not permitted to be broken unless, in case of sickness. To the 19th and last child, she enforced daily routine which made the home an actual school. Six hours a day for 20 years, she taught her children and taught them so well that they were all well educated. They were brought to a regular course of sleeping by laying them in their cradle awake, rocking them to sleep. When they turned a year old, they were taught to fear the rod and to cry softly. As soon as they were grown pretty strong, they were confined to 3 meals a day. They were allowed to eat and drink as much as they would, but not to call for anything.

Her system of moral instruction was equally definite. She took such a portion of time as she could best spare every night to discourse each child by itself. On Monday, she talked to Molly; on Tuesday with Hetty; Wednesday with Nancy; Thursday with Jackie; Friday with Patty; Saturday with Charles; and with Emily and Sukey together on Sunday. Susanna was determined to form their minds aright, to conquer their will, and bring them to obedient temper: patience being her chief ingredient.

While they still lived at South Ormsby, Dr. Annesley, her father, died. As long as she lived, she was fully persuaded that he was constantly near and conversing with her. This deep sense of an almost literal communion of saints was transmitted to her sons, John and Charles. Both repeatedly asserted their belief in the nearness of the departed.




What you need:
