

STANDING IN THE GAP

Last month, I mentioned a book on prayer that I have rediscovered, <u>Intimate Intercession</u>, by Tricia McCary Rhodes and that it had begun to renew my intentions about praying for others. The thoughts and ideas that I share are taken from this book.

The Scriptures are full of stories about people praying for others: safety, freedom, wives, husbands, children, food, health and all the other things we need every day. Those people we read about weren't afraid to ask God for anything and not just ask but ask with expectation of results. But is there a difference between asking and praying and just making someone's needs known?

To Rhodes, the difference is that we "stand in the gap". When Scripture talks of a gap or a breach, it refers to something that is no longer as it ought to be. God made a covenant between the people of Israel and Himself, which the Israelites promptly broke, there was a gap between them and God. God told Moses these stubborn people would be destroyed and He and Moses would start again.

BUT, Moses loved the Israelites stuck and pleaded with the Lord to have mercy. He stood in the gap between them and God. That is intercession: to care for people so much that we are willing to go to God when their souls are tired and overwhelmed and carry their concerns to the Lord. We stand in the gap created by their need and reach out to God.

Join Tim and I as we "stand in the gap" and pray for those on our prayer list on Sunday mornings at 9:30 in the Prayer Chapel. You will not be asked to pray alone, although you may if you would like. We will pray short prayers for specific requests and then take turns praying the names of those on our list

asking for those requests.

Methodist History

Susanna Wesley

Possibly the hardest blow to Samuel was the destruction of the library. Only 2 bits of paper escaped the flames. One was a copy of the only hymn written by Samuel Wesley, now found in the Methodist hymnal, "Behold the Savior of Mankind," and the other, a fragment of his beloved Polyglot Bible, with only a sentence legible: "Sell all thou hast; take up thy cross and follow me."

The family never completely recovered from the fire. The rebuilding of the house plunged them deeper into debt. Susanna once more gathered her children together. She resumed the painstaking process of discipline and education.

Her hands were more than full with children in the nursery and in the schoolroom. However, it was the spiritual welfare of her children, present and absent, that concerned her the most.

For 23 years longer, her life at Epworth continued. As the flames of Samuels life flickered and burned out, son John read the last prayers for the dying. So Samuel Wesley left Epworth rectory, where for 34 years he had suffered and toiled.

Hardly had she lost her husband, when she was called upon to part with her 2 youngest sons who sailed for America in the full flush of missionary zeal. Susanna sent them away with her blessing, although she never expected to see them again. Had she 20 sons, she would rejoice that they were so employed.

In 1739, Susanna returned to London, an aged widow. All her 25 brothers and sisters were dead. Of her own children, nineteen in all, nine of them survived. As her years grew shorter, her mind strayed back to the earlier faith of her girlhood, of her own father's faith and hope.

Susanna Wesley died in July, 1742, at the age of 73. The same son. John, who had read the prayer for his dying father, read for his mother the same comforting words of victory. Her last request was, "Children, as soon as I am released, sing a psalm of praise to God."

Susanna Wesley gave to the world, not to Methodism alone, a new freedom of large faith, a new democracy of vital religion, and a new intimacy with God.





Missions Report 2020

CONGREGATION AND MISSIONS COMMITTEE EFFORTS DURING 2020:

- Jesus said to "feed my sheep." Donations of food for the <u>Allentown UMC Five Loaves Food Pantry</u> continued to be strong in 2020 with St. Paul's individuals faithfully filling the food bins every month. Thank you to all who donated food to feed those families who are in need in our Elida community;
- St. Paul's has monetarily supported the <u>Meals 'til Monday</u> mission which provides weekend meals to children from various elementary schools in and around Allen County, including Elida Elementary;
- Bev Nesbitt and her band of faithful workers processed <u>87 school kits and 69 health kits</u> donated by numerous members of our congregation as part of this annual mission effort. Pastor Paul will deliver the kits to the local collection point when directed to do so;
- The small group, <u>Crafty Creatures</u> continues to bless our congregation and our community with their mission of <u>prayer shawls</u>, <u>blankets</u>, <u>and quilts</u>. They also made significant contributions to our annual mission, <u>Christmas Tree of hats</u>, <u>gloves</u>, <u>mittens</u>, <u>and scarves</u> which were donated to Samaritan House and other local shelters. 96 items were donated;
- Our members gave a total of \$565 during <u>Coins-at-Communion</u> on the first Sunday of each month. Recipients of these funds included <u>many local missions</u> as well as <u>UMCOR</u>. Our members also gave \$845 to <u>United Methodist Special Sundays</u> such as <u>UMCOR Sunday</u>, and <u>Student Day</u>;
- St. Paul's donated \$177 to <u>Brad Joseph Memorial Fund</u>. The <u>Memorial Golf Outing</u> was <u>cancelled</u> this year due to COVID but will return in 2021. The <u>Memorial Fund</u> has given out scholarships for medical mission trips to Kenya, Dominican Republic, Haiti, Mexico & Uganda in the past eleven years;
- Jamie Wyant led an effort by our members to build three <u>wheel-chair ramps</u> and repair two ramps for people with special needs to gain access to their homes. This continues to be a unique mission both funded and constructed by St. Paul's members;
- Families were housed by <u>Family Promise</u> four separate weeks during 2020. However, due to COVID, the families were housed at the Wingate Hotel in Lima. The members <u>provided hot meals</u> on Friday's of those weeks.
- On October 31st members of St. Paul's handed out coffee, hot chocolate and pencils to parents and their children at the church for our <u>Trick-or-Treat Night Mission</u>. Over 300 cups of hot beverages were distributed along with pencils with our name and website on them. Members also participated by donating candy and manning the trunks for <u>Trunk-or-Treat</u>. Our members enjoyed this memorable evening;
- Our Easter offering was designated to the <u>Five Loaves Food Pantry</u>, <u>Our Daily Bread soup kitchen</u> and <u>Meals 'til Monday</u> missions. \$501was given to each of these missions. \$500 of our Christmas offering went to <u>West Ohio Conference Church Camps</u>, and \$840 was donated to <u>UMCOR U. S. Disaster Relief</u> to help people recover from hurricanes, floods, forest fires and tornados.
- Our youth and adults anonymously left \$207 on "the cow" in the hallway to send to <u>Heifer International</u> to purchase a goat and several chickens for families around the world. Thank-you to our youth and adults for their generous donations;
- A new outreach program called <u>Sunshine Bags</u> was started this year during the pandemic. People of the church donated candy and fun items to be put in bags to **bring sunshine** to our congregation during these unusual times. This effort continues in 2021 with bags eventually being delivered to all members and some church neighbors.
- St. Paul's Church again participated in a worldwide mission by <u>Samaritan's Purse</u> called <u>Operation Christmas Child.</u> Jamie Wyant headed up the collection of 55 shoeboxes. The shoeboxes were filled with gifts for boys or girls, and given to <u>Samaritan's Purse</u> to distribute to children worldwide. Thank-you to all who filled boxes with gifts for these children with personal letters included;

The people of St. Paul's United Methodist Church donated over \$14,586 to special missions, coins-for-communion, United Methodist Special Sundays, special designated Sundays and other missions and ministries of our church. Thank-you to all who donated to these missions. As we go forward into 2021 we are looking for new ways to impact our community and the world to show people the love of Jesus Christ!














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The People of St. Paul's

Living Our Faith

The Parable Of The Lost Ring

Only three years after Paula and Joe Walter married, her wedding ring was lost as she played catch with their son. Naturally, she was heartbroken. Over the years, whenever family and friends gathered in the back yard, she urged everyone to look for the ring — but to no avail. Because the yard borders on woods, Paula feared the ring had flown into the trees, never to be seen again. But just before the couple's 40th anniversary, landscapers hired to do work in the yard brought her a surprise: They'd found the ring — right where Paula had been playing with her child so long ago! Like the woman in Jesus' parable who finally found her lost coin (Luke 15:8-10), Paula rejoiced. God too searches until every person who has strayed or been flung away from the faith is found. Sometimes the place we rediscover faith is right where we've looked before. What makes the difference? A different person helping us search? Light shining in a different way? We may never know. We simply rejoice — and so does God
