




Do you suffer from CSSTP? CSSTP isn't another variant of the current virus. It stands for Can't Sit Still to Pray. There are many people who suffer from this handicap. Some have ADD, some are children who aren't designed to sit quietly for long periods of time (or ANY periods of time), some are parents of those children who can't sit still, some are just people with busy lives. There are many reasons why people have CSSTP. The problem is, we still need to spend time with God to have a relationship. What would our relationship with our family be like if we spent the same amount of time with them as we spend with God? Ouch—not very good!

This year I will be offering ways to pray that doesn't require sitting still. There are actually many ways of doing that, but there is no magic solution. The movement, sensory involvement, writing, drawing, walking, are ways for you to involve your body enough to free your mind to focus and listen. After writing about each one, I will add needed items to our Prayer Room to enable you to try a new prayer experience.

Hymn History

We Three Kings of Orient Are

Then Sings My Soul" Book 2, By Robert J. Morgan

1857

Now after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea in the days of Herod the king, behold, wisemen from the East came to Jerusalem... Matthew 2:1 (NKJV)

Strange but true: A visit from St. Nicholas paved the way for "We Three Kings." It happened like this. After the war of 1812, Anglicans in America decided to establish their own seminary for training Episcopalian ministers. The proposal was first made in 1814; and in 1817, the Episcopalian General Convention voted to locate the school in New York City. But where in New York?

Clement Clark Moore, son of New York's Episcopalian Bishop, was an up-and-coming land developer. He had recently become well-known because of a poem he had written, which began:

'Twas the night before Christmas, when all through the house not a creature was stirring, not even a mouse...

The popularity of this poem (reportedly written following a sleigh ride home from Greenwich Village) made his name a household word. The fame and increased income made him more generous and sought-after layman.


Moore owned a large estate in the undeveloped northern regions of Manhattan. He referred to it as "a quiet, rural retreat on the picturesque banks of the Hudson." Hearing that the Episcopalians needed land for their seminary, he offered a portion of his estate, and thus was born General Theological Seminary. Moore, also a linguist and Hebrew scholar, became one of General's first professors, teaching biblical languages.

Some years later, a reporter named John H. Hopkins, Jr., enrolled in this seminary. Born in Pittsburgh, Hopkins had matriculated at the University of Vermont before moving to New York to pursue legal studies. But fell in love with the Lord's work, enrolled in General, and graduated from the seminary in 1850. In 1855, he was hired as the school's first instructor of church music.

Hopkins wrote "We Three Kings" as part of a Christmas pageant produced by General Theological Seminary in 1857. In 1863 it was published in his *Carols, Hymns, and Songs*. This hymnal went through three editions by 1882, establishing Hopkins as a leader in Episcopalian hymnody. He wrote hymns, but most have fallen into obscurity. "We Three Kings" was his crowning achievement, made possible, in a way, through the generosity of another poet whose most famous work ends:

But I heard him exclaim 'ere he drove out of sight, Merry Christmas to all, and to all a good night!





Lighting the Way For Others

When Ida Nelson, head tribal clerk of a remote Alaskan village, heard an airplane flying low after dark, she knew something was wrong. Igiugig (Igggy-yaw-gigg), population 70, isn't normally a nighttime destination. Indeed, the medevac flight was coming to pick up a sick child.

Because the local airstrip's lights had been vandalized, the plane was having trouble landing. Nelson began alerting neighbors, and within minutes, villagers lined the runway with their vehicles, headlights blazing. The pilot was able to land and then safely deliver the sick child to an Anchorage hospital. The airlift service praised the residents' determination, but Nelson describes their effort as "normal" and "ordinary."

What everyday actions can you use to provide light amid darkness? How can you shine Jesus' light in a world that needs him?
