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

2023 Annual Conference

Annual Conference Summary

Linda Craft, Lay Delegate

Pastor Paul drove us to The Dayton Convention Hall each day for the 54th session of the West Ohio Annual Conference, which was the first in-person annual conference since 2019. Bishop Gregory Palmer presided over the conference using the theme, "Committed, Connected, Community" based on Hebrews 10:23-25.

Thursday morning began with Clergy and Laity Sessions. Following this, we engaged in a teaching lesson led by Reba Collins, Community Engagement Coordinator for West Ohio Justice ministry, All in Community. She led us in interactive activities to help us understand ways, to have a better-connected community and church. We shared experiences, with each other, on how we feel connected or disconnected from a community. A thoughtful idea to consider is that it takes 90 seconds to connect and only 4 seconds to disconnect. Judgment is an obstacle that keeps us from connection and community. Self-judgment drives the judgment of others, and judgment causes division.

Sprinkled throughout the conference time, many reports, celebrations, awards, offerings, services, recommendations, and Fixing of Appointments occurred. You may view these at westohioumc.org/ac/2023.

During the legislative time, nine recommendations were presented to vote upon. All recommendations passed, except for number 4 which concerned our three camps. The Board of Trustees withdrew this recommendation to allow more time to study potential options for the disposition of the camps and retreat properties. This recommendation will be presented again, at the special October conference. It was also announced that adequate staffing could not be met this year; therefore, no camping programs will be operational.

During the Episcopal Address, Bishop Palmer stated that our calling is to serve this present age during this storm, and one of our storms is disaffiliation. We have given much attention to disaffiliation, but we were reminded that this challenge is not Jesus' mission nor the mission of The United Methodist Church. Our one mission is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

In other business of the conference, we were told, 172 churches requested disaffiliation from The United Methodist Church. This was supported by conference members. North Star churches are prepared to welcome United Methodists, whose home churches have disaffiliated. Bishop Palmer concluded, saying, "Our focus will continue to be on a vibrant future for the West Ohio Conference of The United Methodist Church, and its more than 700 churches and the communities in which they serve."



She was the organist, played the piano, performed many beautiful duets with Lois Cook for worship services, and added beautiful flute music for our Christmas services, as well as many other times, along with singing in the choir. She regularly volunteered to do duets, trios, and quartets. She invited us to attend the Hallelujah Saint's Band, the Lima Concert Band, Civic Chorus, and Lima Symphony and Chorus, as she played and supported all of those groups tirelessly. During our Covid years, she always provided beautiful music from the organ to broadcast to all who tuned in to our services.

She headed up the Senior Luncheons for many years. In these, she always had a theme and activity for seniors to not only receive a great meal but to have additional stimulation and socialization, to take away from the event.

Linda was a great cook, and added many a good dish to any dinner St. Paul's conducted. She was pivotal in the Koinonia Chicken Barbecue fundraisers as she typically organized the making of the delicious potato salad creation with a recipe her own mother had used at Bath Local Schools. She was highly praised for all the great cherry pies she made, and all looked forward to eating the delicious cherries she had handpicked from her many Michigan trips to Bear Lake, her home away from home.

She was always willing to host a Koinonia meeting at her home and provided a welcoming atmosphere to all who attended.

Linda had energy and a drive that surpassed most of us. She rarely used the word, "no," and always had a pleasant demeanor to interact with all she encountered. In previous times, she headed up Vacation Bible School, directed the choir, organized many funeral dinners, served as a lay delegate to larger church events, including General Conferences at Lakeside, and attended many administrative meetings, to help plan and organize countless numbers of worship services, Sunday School, and fundraising events, and many other avenues to promote St. Paul's, and put the message of Jesus' love forth for all to hear and experience.

Linda's legacy to St. Paul's United Methodist Church is one of service and humility. She did not ask for recognition, and many had no idea how much time and effort she put into our church. She was often willing to drive the six-hour trip from Bear Lake home in order to play for worship service or choir if needed. Her life and circumstances were unique. Sometimes we fail to recognize the totality of what others offer until they are gone. Linda leaves a large gap in our church and big shoes to fill. She will be sorely and deeply missed, but always remembered and cherished.



Keep Trying

In *The God Who Stays*, contemporary Christian musician Matthew West writes about the pandemic's fear-filled early days. After his concert tour was abruptly canceled in March 2020, he rode to an airport "feeling utterly hopeless about a world that was spinning out of control."

Then Arthur, his ride-share driver, began singing along to the radio — and the song happened to be West's "The God Who Stays." West joined in, jokingly asking how he sounded. "Not so good," Arthur replied, not knowing West's identity. "You keep trying."

The driver shared how those lyrics uplifted him during life's difficulties, and West later recalled that conversation during lockdown, while wondering where God was. The musician realized he had "settled for a socially distant relationship with the One who is nearer than I dare to believe, closer than the air I breathe." But West pictured "God running toward me with open arms like the prodigal's father," and he resolved to keep trying — and to grow closer to the God who always stays.

Featured Recipes from St. Paul's Great Cooks

Star-Spangled Lemon Icebox Pie

Ingradiants	
Ingredients	
15	Pecan shortbread cookies
	(Pecan sandies)
1 Tb1.	Sugar
3 Tb1.	Butter
8 oz.	Cream Cheese, softened
1/2 cup	Mascarpone cheese *(Italian Cream cheese)*
4 571.1	,
1 Tbl.	Lemon zest, grated
1/2 cup	Lemon juice
1 can 14 oz	Sweetened condensed milk
1 cup	Strawberries, sliced
1 cup	Blueberries

Instructions

Preheat oven 350 degrees. Place cookies and sugar in a food processor until ground. Add melted butter and stir until combined.

Press mixture into the bottom and sides of 9-inch pie plate. Bake 15 to 20 minutes, or until lightly browned. Cool on wire rack.

Using a hand or stand mixer with a large bowl, beat cheeses, lemon zest, and lemon juice until smooth. Gradually add milk.

Spread mixture into crust. Cover and refrigerate at least 4 hours or until filling Is set. Place strawberries around the edges of the pie and arrange blueberries into a star shape in the center.

Serves 8

** If you can't find mascarpone cheese—typically found in the specialty cheese case –swap in an equal amount of full-fat Greek yogurt or sour cream.**

A sprinkle of pepper and a dab of soap illustrate a big concept from God's Word.



What you need:

- · Shallow dish
- Water
- Black ground pepper
- · Toothpick
- · Dish soap
- Bible

What you do:


- With the dish on a table, fill it halfway with water. Don't jiggle the dish.
- Sprinkle pepper on the water.
- Dab the toothpick into a drop of soap. Then touch its tip to the center of the water and observe.
- 4. Read Psalm 103:8-12. How does this experiment illustrate God's forgiveness?
- Explain the science behind this experiment: The soap disturbs the water's surface tension. The soap molecules don't want to interact with the water. This repels the water molecules from the soap, causing the floating pepper to also move to the sides.




SEPARATION FROM SIN

Turn Your Platform Into An Altar

Having a platform — or an avenue to communicate with lots of people — can be useful to share important messages, as long as we don't focus on our number of followers and pageviews. A platform also may tempt us to think we're the gift being offered; instead, I like to picture an altar. It's a place of offering and humility, where we give sacrificially through the reach God provides.

Use these reminders to view your platform as an altar:

- Strive to obey and trust God, who calls and strengthens you.
- Be a good steward of God's gifts and messages, caring for the people you're reaching.
- Avoid comparisons with others, looking to God alone for validation and approval

Through Abraham's willingness to surrender his only son, the Old Testament patriarch modeled how a platform can become an altar. So did Jesus, the sinless Lamb of God, who became the ultimate sacrifice to pay our debt. As his New Testament followers, it's our privilege to invite others into this paradoxical kingdom, to give of ourselves as a living sacrifice.
