




## **History Of A Hymn**

#### "Have Thine Own Way, Lord"

"Then Sings My Soul" By Robert J. Morgan

#### 1907

... as the clay is in the potter's hands, so are you in my hand... Jeremiah 18:6

"Hope differed makes the heart sick," says Proverbs 13:12. Yet "*dis*appointments are *His* appointments." God uses set backs to renew our focus on Him, to strengthen our faith, and to divert us to other opportunities. In this case, a bitter disappointment led to one of our greatest invitational hymns.

Its author, Adelaide Pollard, was born in Iowa during the Civil War. Her parents named her Sarah, but when she was old enough, she changed her name to "Adelaide," not liking the name "Sarah." After attending the Boston School of Oratory (Emerson College), she moved to Chicago to teach in a girls' school.


While in Chicago and struggling with frail health, she was attracted to the strange ministry of John Alexander Dowie, a Scottish-born faith healer who was drawing international attention. In 1901, Dowie announced he was the Elijah who would precede the Coming of Christ. Purchasing 6,800 acres of land outside Chicago, he began building "Zion City," which, despite a strong start, ended in failure. Adelaide, however, was apparently healed of diabetes through Dowie's ministry.

Afterward, she became very involved in the work of an evangelist named Sanford, who was predicting the imminent return of Christ. In New England, where she had moved to assist Sanford, she felt God was calling her to Africa as a missionary. But, to her intense disappointment, she was unable to raise her financial support. Heartsick, Adelaide, in her forties at the time, attended a prayer meeting. That night an elderly women prayed, "It doesn't matter what you bring into our lives, Lord. Just have your own way with us."

That phrase rushed into Adelaide's heart, and the verse began shaping in her mind. At home that evening, she read again the story of the potter and the clay in Jeremiah 18. By bedtime she had written out the prayer, "Have Thine Own Way."

Adelaide did eventually make it to Africa, but the outbreak of World War I sent her to Scotland and, later, back to America where she wrote poems, spoke to groups, and ministered freely.

In the middle of December, 1934, Adelaide, 72, purchased a ticket at New York's Penn Station. She was heading to Pennsylvania for a speaking engagement. While waiting for the train, she was stricken with a seizure and shortly thereafter died.





Beyond that, your commitment to kits has done so much right here in Ohio. After last year's tornadoes, your help meant recovery for families in Dayton. It meant struggling

children in Franklinton (Columbus) could get the school supplies they needed for success. It meant neighbors at Cherry Street Mission in Toledo could stay clean and healthy while at the shelter.



- Popcorn





- 1. Carefully thread a yard of floss through the needle.

## **Living Our Faith**

#### **Highly Esteemed**

After returning from a lengthy mission trip overseas, John Huffman and his fellow passengers were held up in customs for two hours. When he finally made it to the packed airport lobby, Huffman realized it might take a while to find his family. But suddenly his 3-year-old daughter ran toward him yelling, "Daddy! Daddy! That's my daddy!" and launched into his arms.

"What a welcome," he writes. "I have never felt so loved and acknowledged in my life." Perhaps that's how God feels when we call on his name in worship and prayer, acknowledging him as our heavenly Father — and honoring him above all else.

#### The Act of Asking

In *Everyday Spirituality*, James Hazelwood explores 27 ordinary activities that are, he asserts, more spiritual than we tend to think. One is asking questions. "We see God in all the questions we ask, whether or not they are religious. The simple act of asking questions indicates that we are meaning-seeking creatures."

The pastor continues: "We inquire of the meaning of life, the purpose of work and relationships. We even ask it of our very own existence. The answers often come not in clear proclamations of certainty but in stories, tales and the myths of life.

...Inquiry, wonder, and discovery are things that the human mind loves." Then he offers this thought-provoking statement: "When we ask questions, we are engaging in prayer."

Do you agree? What other daily activities might be more intertwined with your faith than you thought? While you ponder even *these* questions, do you sense the Holy Spirit moving you?
