

The policies below are to help keep us safe as we gather for worship. Our leadership is in continual discussion as state and CDC guidelines change.

- Offering plates are available at each entrance. Please place your offering in the plate.
- Communion is with prepackaged single serve wafer and juice, the first Sunday of each month. The single serve cups are at each sanctuary entrance on Communion Sunday's.

Bulletins — with inserts will be placed in the pews.

Hymn Sing — Hymnals are back in the pews for you to choose your favorite hymn during the Hymn Sing. If you are watching the service remotely you may contact Pastor Paul or the office with your favorite hymn suggestion.

Children's Moments — The Children will be called to the front of the sanctuary. Pastor Paul will once again have "Stump the Pastor". This is when a child or someone brings in an item to place in a box and Pastor Paul has to come up with a Children's sermon that relates to the item left in the box. If he can not come up with a relatable sermon then that person get's something special. There is a sign-up sheet on the front pew, to bring a "stump the Pastor" item. Rules you will need to follow;

- 1. Please do Not bring in anything alive and biting (the Scannell rule)
- 2. Please do Not bring in anything dead and rotting (the Burris rule)
- 3. It must fit in the box (Safety 3rd)
- 4. You must tell me what the object is and what it is used for (the Clouse rule).

Prayer

Whom to Pray For

I am continuing with thoughts on intercessory prayer from the book <u>Intimate Intercession</u> by Tricia McCary Rhodes

So many prayer requests! So many people in need! So many opportunities to join with others in prayer! An internet search on "intercession" from a few years ago had 746,000 sites! I get so overwhelmed that I give up and don't pray for anyone.

Remember Martha, who was busy when Jesus was teaching and got "in trouble" for it? Tricia McCary Rhodes sees a parallel for those of us trying to pray for others. What Martha was doing needed to be done. The meals weren't going to fix themselves, and no one would want to wait for several hours for her to fix them, when they were hungry. But first, Martha needed to be still and listen. Jesus would guide her in what really needed to be done. Jesus fed 5,000 people with a few fish and some bread. The group would have figured something out when the time came. She needed to be still.

Rhodes teaches that before we attack all those prayer requests, we need to be still and listen for what and where God wants us to be. All prayer requests are worthy, but maybe not all are where my attention is supposed to be directed. I need to listen to my friend, Jesus, to know what he has for me to do. King Solomon in Ecclesiastes 5:2 says, "Do not be hasty in word or impulsive in thought to bring up a matter in the presence of God. For God is in heaven and you are on the earth; therefore let your words be few."

But being still is hard! Listening and not talking is hard. The good thing is that God is our friend. He won't quit on us even if we are pretty lame in our attempts to listen. Moses was alerted to God through the burning bush, but it took many experiences before he trusted and listened to God: learning about his culture when he was raised as an Egyptian; arguing with God, then Aaron, then the Israelites about his worthiness; going before Pharoah with only a staff and watching it turn into a snake and many other steps. He and God kept working with each other to develop a relationship. It took some work before they were honest with each other.

If you would like a time to just sit and get to know God and to begin to listen, join us on Sunday mornings at 9:30 a.m. in the Prayer Chapel. If you feel led to pray for those on our prayer list, or for specific conditions of those on our prayer list, join us. This is a short session in which we say the names of those on our hearts and on our list. It is a time to join together to learn at the Master's side.



Hymn History

O For a Thousand Tongues to Sing

"Then Sings My Soul" Book 1, By Robert J. Morgan

1739

....The whole multitude...began to rejoice and praise God with a loud voice for all the mighty works they had seen. Luke 19:37

The Wesley brothers sent word of their conversion to their sainted mother, Susanna, who didn't know what to make of it. "You have fallen into an odd way of thinking," she replied. "You say that till within a few months you had no spiritual life and no justifying faith... I heartly rejoice that you have attained to a strong and lively hope in God's mercy through Christ. Not that I can think that you were totally without saving faith before, but it is one thing to have faith, and another thing to be sensible we have it."

Well, Charles was now very sensible of having it. His life changed, and he gained victory over both his temper and his unfortunate drinking habit. "I was amazed to find my old enemy, intemperance, so suddenly subdued, that I almost forgot I was ever in bondage to him."


He also began to spread the news of what had happened to him. "In the coach to London," he wrote, "I preached faith in Christ. A lady was extremely offended...(and) threatened to beat me. I declared I deserved nothing but Hell; so did she; and must confess it, before she could have a title in heaven. This was most intolerable to her."

New vitality came into Charles' public preaching. He discontinued the practice of reading the sermons, and began preaching extemporaneously.

He found a fruitful arena for ministry at the infamous Newgate Prison, and allowed himself to be locked up with condemned men on nights before their executions, that he might comfort and witness to them during their final few hours.

As the first anniversary of his conversion approached, Charles wrote an eighteen-stanza hymn describing his praise to the Lord. It was titled, "For the Anniversary of One's Conversion," and the first stanza began: "Glory to God, and praise, and love...." Verse seven began, "O for a thousand tongues to sing," inspired by a statement Charles heard: "Had I a thousand tongues, I would praise Him with them all."

Beginning with a 1767 hymnbook, the seventh stanza was made the first, and when John Wesley complied *his collection of hymns* in 1780, he chose this for the first hymn in the book. Congregations today usually sing verses seven, eight, nine, and ten of Wesley's original, which we know today as "O For a Thousand Tongues to Sing."



Methodist History

Francis Asbury

August 1745- March 1816

One of the first bishops of the Methodist Episcopal Church in the United States.

Francis Asbury was born in Hamstead Bridge, Staffordshire, England, to Elizabeth and Joseph Asbury. The family then moved to a cottage at Great Bar, Sandwell. This boyhood home still stands and is open as Bishop Asbury Cottage Museum.

Francis's mother, Eliza, found renewed faith a few years after the passing of her oldest daughter when Francis was less than 3 yrs. Old. She began to read the Bible every day and encouraged her son to do so as well.

Eliza's deep faith may not have been shared by her husband. Francis Asbury described his father as "industrious". Joseph Asbury supported his wife in her faith and witness: he allowed Methodist meetings to be held each Sunday in their cottage.

During Asbury's childhood, the West Midlands was undergoing massive changes as the industrial revolution swept through the area. Waves of workers migrated into the area, attracted by jobs in the growing factories and workshops in Birmingham and the Black Country of the mines.

Francis Asbury attended a local endowed school in Snail's Green, a nearby hamlet. He did not get along well with his fellow pupils, who ridiculed him because of his mother's religious beliefs. During the 1740s there had been a widespread ant-Methodist rioting in Wednesbury and the surrounding area, and into the 1750s a great deal of persecution. Nor did he like his teacher and left school at the first opportunity.

Asbury took a keen interest in religion, having "felt something of God as early as the age of seven". He lived not far from All Saint's Church, Bromwich, which under the patronage of the Methodist Earl of Dartmouth, provided a living for Evangelical minister Edward Stillinghurst. Well connected, Stillinghurst invited, as visiting preachers, some of the foremost preachers and theologians of the day. Francis's mother encouraged him to meet with the Methodist in Wednesbury, eventually joining a "band" with four other young men who would meet and pray together. For them, a typical Sunday would be a preaching meeting at 5:00 AM, communion at the parish church mid-morning, and attending a preaching meeting again at 5:00 PM.

Asbury had his first job at age thirteen; he went "into service" for local gentry, whom he later described as "one of the most ungodly families in the parish". He eventually worked for Thomas Foxall, at the Old Forge Farms, where he made metal goods. He became great friends with Foxall's son, Henry. Their friendship continued after Henry Foxall migrated to Colonial America. There he continued working with metal and established the Foundry Church in Georgetown, now part of Washington D.C. Asbury began to preach locally, and eventually became itinerant preacher on behalf of the Methodist cause.



KIDZ KORNER



Make a sunflower, which turns its head to follow the sun.

What you need:

- · Paper plate
- Yellow marker
- Scissors
- Yarn (black and brown)

What you do:

- Color the entire plate yellow.
- Around the edge, cut out an odd number of triangles.
 Evenly space the cuts to form flower petals.
- Poke a hole in the plate's center. String black yarn through the hole and over one triangle cut. Tie a knot at the back of the plate.
- Continue looping yarn through the hole and over the remaining cuts. Secure the end. The flower should look like a wagon wheel with black spokes.
- Tie the brown yarn to a black "spoke." Weave the brown yarn over and under the spokes in a circle. Continue until the sunflower has a large center. Then tie the end.
- Display your craft as a reminder to follow the Son, Jesus!
