

Prayer

What? Me An Intercessor?

I am continuing with thoughts from <u>Intimate Intercession</u>, by Tricia McCary Rhodes.

I (Corinne) have often attempted to set aside a time for prayer on a deliberate basis. I have usually failed after one day. I read how I am supposed to have discipline and pray every day and I read of people who spend hours in prayer, who stay up all night in prayer, who are the "prayer warriors" and I feel like a failure at prayer.

Rhodes makes a statement that wakes me up: "If you are a Christian, you are, by your very nature, an intercessor. When God saved you, He filled you with the life of Christ, who is always interceding." So we are all prayer warriors-some of us might just be a little braver than others.

But how do we spend the hours doing this? How do we stay disciplined? How do we find the right words? The answer: JUST BE YOURSELF! God created each of us differently. "how we intercede, when we intercede, the words we use, the tone we adopt, how long we intercede-all these things that come from the core of who we already are in Christ." (Rhodes, p.15) We will all "Stand in the Gap" with God in different ways. In the wise words of Nike-Just do it!

If I don't feel like I get anywhere with my prayers, that's ok. God uses my weakness to demonstrate His strength. **God** will transform our humility by doing what we cannot do alone.

Come and join Tim and I as we pray for those on our prayer list. We meet Sunday morning at 9:30 in the Prayer Chapel. No one is asked to pray alone, just to join us as we name those on our list. Bring your gifts and weaknesses. God will hear us.

A Breath Of Fresh Prayer

Norwegian theologian Ole Hallesby described prayer as simply letting God into our lives. God "knocks," he said, "not only in the solemn hours of secret prayer" but "in the midst of your daily work, your daily struggles, your daily grind ... when you need him most."

Prayer, added Hallesby, is as essential to life as air. "As impossible as it is for us to take a breath in the morning large enough to last us until noon, so impossible is it to pray in the morning in such a way as to last us until noon," he said. "Let your prayers ascend to [God] constantly, audibly or silently, as circumstances throughout the day permit."



Methodist History

John Wesley And The Methodist Society

Samuel, John's older brother, was already a teacher in Westminster School, London, when it came time, at the age of ten, for John to leave home for his advanced education. There was not enough money for him to enter his brother's school, but he did receive a scholarship for Charter House School. He was a hard worker— a quiet, orderly student. He soon attracted other students to him who also were eager to learn, even though it meant giving up their play time to listen to John's story-telling. He thought first of being a teacher, but since he had grown up in a family where one thought first of religion, he felt that he should go into the ministry. At the age of seventeen, he entered Oxford University, again on a scholarship. He was so thin and small (being five feet four inches tall), that few noticed him. But it was not long before he was accepted for his skill in answering questions on religion and scholarly subjects. He grew more and more determined to help people. He regulated his time carefully. He adopted his mother's philosophy of "every duty has a time." He was on time for every duty.

John's younger brother, Charles, was a student at Lincoln College, Oxford, when John, already a priest in the Church of England, went there to teach. Charles had organized a club for study on a regular basis. John became it's recognized head. This club was so methodically organized that other students called them Methodists. John was training his mind well and was becoming a man of action. He wanted to practice what he preached. He saw around him so much dirt, poverty and ignorance. Few persons, regardless of their economic level, cared little for goodness and mercy or spiritual growth. This serious-minded group of young men soon became involved in doing what they could to relieve the plight of those less fortunate than they.

John was often tired, for he drove himself from early morning til late at night. He accounted for every minute. He once said to his brother Charles, "leisure and I have taken leave of one another and I propose to be busy as long as I live." He rose at 4 A.M. to keep his diaries and journals, read while walking or on horse back, denied himself ever luxury, even letting his hair grow long to save money to give to the poor. When developed a cough which would not leave, he realized that he would not have the physical strength to do all he wanted. He found a book on health and long life which advocated eating sparingly, drinking nothing but water, and spending much time outdoors. When the advanced symptoms of tuberculosis appeared, this regimen of living cured him.



Hymn History

Alas! And Did My Savior Bleed

But God forbid that I should boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ. Galatians 6:14

After his graduation from college, Isaac Watts returned to Southampton, England, and spent two years writing hymns for Above Bar Congregational Church. He then moved to London to tutor children in a wealthy family of dissenters. While there he joined Mark Lane Independent Chapel. Soon he was asked to be a teacher in the church, and in 1698, he was hired as associate pastor. There, on his twenty-fourth birthday, he preached his first sermon. In 1702, he became senior pastor of the church, a position he retained the rest of his life. He was a brilliant Bible student, and his sermons brought the church to life.

In 1707, his *Hymns and Spiritual Songs* was published. Isaac had written most of these hymns in Southampton while in late teens and early twenties. Included was a hymn now considered the finest hymn ever written in the English language. It was based on Galatians 6:14: "But God forbid that I should boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ." Originally the first stanza said: *When I survey the wonderous cross / Where the young Prince of Glory died...* In an enlarged 1709 edition, Watts rewrote the lines to say:

When I survey the wonderous cross On which the Prince of glory died, My richest gain I count but loss, And pour contempt on all my pride.

Also included in the 1707 hymnbook was "Heavenly Joy on Earth," better known today as "Come, We That Love the Lord," or "We're Marching to Zion."

Another hymn was "Godly Sorrow Arising from the Suffering of Christ," better known as "Alas! And Did My savior Bleed." This hymn later played a major roll in the conversion of a great American hymnist. In 1851, Fanny Crosby, 31, attended a revival service at John Street Methodist Church in New York. "After a prayer was offered," she recalled, "they began to sing the grand old consecration hymn, 'Alas! And Did My Savior Bleed' and when they reached the third line of the fifth stanza, 'Here Lord, I give myself away,' my very soul was flooded with celestial light."

How right that Watts should, long after his death, play a part in winning to Christ the author of a new generation of hymns and gospel songs!

Ingredier	nts	Instructions		
4 tsp.	Olive oil, classic, divided	In large skillet heat 2 tsp. oil over medium heat 1 minute or until hot. Add onion; cook 3 to 5 minutes or until softened.		
1/2 cup	Onion, yellow, finely choped	Add sweet potatoes and thyme. Cook 8 to 10 minutes or until tender. Remove from skillet and set aside.		
2 medium	Sweet potatoes, pealed & diced	In saucepan heat broth over medium heat; reduce heat to medium-low; simmer.		
3/4 tsp.	Dried thyme	Add remaining oil to skillet; stir in rice and 1/2 cup of broth.		
3 cups	Chicken broth	Cook, stirring ,until broth is absorbed. Stir in broth 1/2 cu at a time; cook and stir until each addition of broth		
1 cup	Arborio rice	absorbed. Continue to cook and stir just until rice is creamy.

Setting Captives Free

Though St. Patrick's Day has become a secular "holiday," March 17 commemorates the life of a Christian missionary. St. Patrick grew up in a Christian home in Britain but wasn't very devout until he experienced crisis. As a teen, he was captured and sold into slavery in Ireland, escaping after six years. "The Lord opened my unbelieving eyes" in Ireland, Patrick later said. God led him back there, and he converted tribe after tribe to Christianity.

In *Confessio 61*, St. Patrick writes, "I testify in truth and in great joy of heart before God and his holy angels that I never had any other reason for returning to that nation ... except the Gospel and God's promises.

When God Giggles

Before dinner, our family was preparing to pray, which we do by holding hands. Upon discovering that one child hadn't washed his hands, my husband struck a contorted pose to avoid physical contact. The mealtime blessing quickly dissolved into laughter as we each peeked at him.

Afterward, as we passed around the food, I asked, "What do you imagine God thought about us laughing during prayer?" One child quickly replied, "I think he was laughing right along with us."

Yes! Although prayer is reverent, God invites us to converse with words, emotions — and even giggles!
