



### **Mexico Mission**

### The Power of a Few

In February, Tim and I again had the privilege of being part of the Alabama/Mexico Eyeglass Mission to Cavillo, Mexico. There were thirty-one people in our group, including our daughter, Jennifer Kinney, our daughter's fiancé, Jason Morrison, and our grandson, Logan Kinney. During our week in Mexico, we evaluated the vision of around 2000 people and give out prescription glasses, reading glasses and sunglasses and refer others for surgeries and further treatment. There are always people who stick out in our minds for various reasons, such as adorable little children getting their first glasses or elderly women who only want to be able to see their sewing. There are those whom are brought to us by God such as a woman who wasn't supposed to see our one ophthalmologist but did and found out that, unknown to her, the medicine she had taken for ten years could damage her vision and she needed to see a doctor regularly. The doctor possibly saved her vision. The memories go on.

What impacted me the most this year was our hosts: The Cavillo Lions' Club, made up of SEVEN members. While we provide most of the screening personnel and glasses from used ones donated in the United States, the local Lions' Club provides:

- 1. food and housing for those of us coming in for a week.
- 2. arrange transportation to and from the airport and to and from the hotel to the screening venue
- 3. find a venue large enough to hold several hundred people at a time.
- 4. provide translators for all four days of the clinic for nearly twenty people for eight hours a day.
- 5. arrange follow-up appointments for local surgeries
- 6. purchase specially made glasses when we don't have the correct prescriptions on hand
- 7. handle all publicity about the event
- 8. transportation, for the clients from outlying areas, sometimes,
- 9. and, often a tour of their local areas at the end of the clinic.

Remember, I said, SEVEN people planned and executed this event! Seven people, who loved their community and wanted to serve it. Seven people who looked at the resources they had in schools, stores, restaurants, hotels, bus drivers, and family, went to work and provided 2000 people with eye examinations and glasses. Seven people who dreamed big, worked hard, and made an impact.

Every year I return from this trip in awe of what a group of committed people can accomplish and wonder what I might accomplish with a similar amount of dreaming and dedication.

# **Chicken and White Bean Ragout**

Ingredients	
2 Tbl.	Butter
2 cup	Onions, chopped
2 Tbl.	Garlic, minced
1 cup	Green peppers, chopped
2 cup	Potatoes, diced
1/2 cup	Carrots, diced
1 to 2	Jalapenos, seeded & minced
4 cups	White beans (navy, great northern, garbonzo, or assortment)
1 can (15oz)	Chicken and broth, canned
1 1/2 Tbl.	Cumin
1 Tbl.	Coriander
2 tsp.	Oregano
4 cups	Chicken broth
1 Tbl.	Lime juice
garnish	Cilantro

Saute onions and garlic in butter for 5 minutes.

Add remainder of ingredients.

Instructions

Bring to boil and simmer for 20 minutes.






### What you need:

- Needle and Scissors string
- 12 small pom-poms • Coffee filter
- Wooden craft stick

- 5. Flatten the coffee filter and draw a symmetrical design on it. Pleat in the center to create wings.
- 6. Move the caterpillar puppet by holding the stick. Glue on the wings as you describe the transformation into a butterfly.

### Of Patience and Pruning

In many parts of America, Mother's Day is the recommended date for planting flowers outdoors. Subjecting blooms to the elements any sooner is risky, though sunny spring days sure make waiting tough. Perhaps that's why poet May Sarton calls gardening "an instrument of grace," for it "slows us down and forces patience."

Courage is also required. Gardeners "must be brave enough to cut back the old and sit with bare branches, awaiting new growth," writes Cheryl Richardson (*Waking Up in Winter*). "And we must trust that it will come." When God prunes us, we too must trust that new growth and new life are in store ... and then patiently wait.
