



who are being baptized or confirmed often wear white robes as a sign of purity.

We Remember

More than 150 years ago, Memorial Day took shape amid the backdrop of the U.S. Civil War. Before it ended, women began decorating the graves of fallen soldiers. In 1868, when May 30 was designated as Decoration Day, loved ones placed flowers on the graves of Union and Confederate soldiers alike.

By 1882, Decoration Day became known as Memorial Day, and soldiers who died in other wars were honored too. Over time, it became a day to remember all loved ones who have died — in war and otherwise. In 1971, Congress declared Memorial Day a national holiday to be observed on the last Monday in May. On Memorial Day, we pause to remember people who made the ultimate sacrifice for their country and for our freedom. We also pray for those who continue serving, especially those in harm's way.

Prayer

Praying with Beads

Have you ever "prayed the Rosary"? Have you ever seen pictures of people from other religions touching beads as they walked? Do you think praying with beads is something from "other" religions? Have you ever wondered "why"?

There is something about touching something familiar that can relax or calm us. As we are doing the repetitive action of touching the beads, our minds can focus on other things. Have you ever had "worry beads" or "worry dolls"? These are a string of beads or small dolls to touch as you say your worries. When you are at the end, you put them away and put away your fears with them.

Most of us are at least familiar with the concept of "praying the Rosary". I won't attempt to describe the deeply held beliefs behind this practice, but the basics are that at each bead or item on the rosary, a specific prayer or prayer type is prayed. There is also a "Protestant rosary". Both of these items can be looked up on the internet to get pictures and steps for praying. Each bead on the string is like a counting bead on an abacus to help you stay focused and keep track of what you are doing in case you get off track.

You can make your own string of beads that relates directly to your life. Go through a box of beads (or buttons) and pick out ones that remind you for specific people. Maybe the color is their favorite, maybe the smooth feel reminds you of the peace you feel around them. Put them on a string or chain. Add a cross or religious item that touches you. Then when you sit down to pray, hold the beads, and touch each one to remind you to pray for that person's needs or your own prayers.

For those of us who can't focus on prayer, the physical touch of beads helps us stay centered and frees our mind to focus on listening to God, the ultimate goal of prayer.



The History of the Communion Plates By Ron Steiner

In the Spring of 1987 we started to remodel and add on to the church. I pulled out of the dumpster 5-6 floor joist from under the old stage; I took them over to the farm and put them in one of the haymows. I also took a lot of small pieces, that were in the rollup partitions.

This January, I brought home one of the old floor joist to find out that they were pine about 2"x12"x12 foot long. Later Larry Moser and I went back to get the rest. They were full of square nails dating them back to the year 1890 when the church was built. The church was remodeled in 1910, round nails were used then. That makes the wood in the communion plates 132 yrs. Old.


What a blessing to have that wood to use, but a huge blessing for me to make something out of wood that old, and to know where it came from.



What you do:


- 1. Bend, stretch and cut the carton cups to make 3-D flower shapes. Also cut leaf shapes from the carton top.

God's Hands

Exactly a century ago, Irish physician Alexander Irvine published *My Lady of the Chimney Corner*, a book dedicated to his saintly mother. The protagonist, Anna, lives and ministers to others as Irvine's own mother had done.

In the story, Anna visits a neighbor who has just lost a son at sea. After talking for a while, Anna suggests they pray together. With heads bowed, she reaches to place a loving hand on the grieving mother's forehead. Afterward, the woman says, "I think I felt his touch upon my brow," referring to God.

Anna says, "God is everywhere looking for hands to use. Sometimes he takes the hand of a doctor and uses it in healing. Sometimes he takes the hand of a mother to soothe the brow of a fevered child. And sometimes he takes the hand of an old critter like me to bring a bit of help and comfort to a neighbor. But they are all God's hands, and God is everywhere looking for hands to use."
