

If God is in pain because some of his children have too little, we can share our resources. In so doing, we welcome Christ the King among us, and give him meaningful thanks. Well, it happened in September! The 51<sup>st</sup> session of the West Ohio Conference was a virtual gathering of nearly 1,600 clergy and lay members. Bishop Gregory Palmer presided over the conference under the theme, "Be Not Afraid, God Is With Us." Using the 21<sup>st</sup> chapter of Revelation, the Bishop preached about uncertain times facing our nation, world and global churches. How appropriate for this Covid pandemic period with which we are living. Bishop Palmer further added, "in spite of the chaos... God says, 'I'm going to make a home among you.' What a God! God does not abandon us. God is with us." As always this sermon was uplifting. The Virtual Choir was awesome to watch and hear as they sang Mark Miller's arrangement of "And Are We Yet Alive." 

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## History of a Hymn

## We Gather Together

"Then Sings My Soul" Book 2, By Robert J. Morgan

#### 1597

So the nations shall fear the name of the Lord, And all the kings of the earth Your glory. Psalm 102:15 (NKJV)

Those who have visited the Netherlands with it's picturesque dikes and windmills may be unaware of the terrific struggles for religious freedom that took place there in the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries. In 1555, the low country was given to King Philip II of Spain by his father, Emperor Charles V of Germany. Philip was an arch-Catholic, but the winds of Calvinistic Reformation had reached the Netherlands. Roman Catholic churches were plundered, and the authority of Spain was resisted.

In 1557, King Philip sent the dreaded Duke of Alba (Fernando Alvarez de Toledo) to bring the Netherlands back into the Pope's fold. He established a reign of terror during which ten thousand people were executed and another forty thousand exiled. His ruling counsel was called the "Council of Troubles," but it's better known to history as the "Blood Council." Alva didn't hesitate to massacre whole cities. An attack on Leiden was stopped only by cutting the dikes and flooding the countryside.

On January 6, 1579, the Catholic southern regions of the Netherlands (modern Belgium) declared their allegiance to Philip; but three weeks later the northern part (modern Holland) refused to submit to the Catholic rule of Spain. In 1581, Holland declared its independence, led by the courageous William of Orange. Holland was devastated by warfare, and in the process William was cut down by an assassin's dagger. But the brave nation would not be denied, and eventually Spain lost its hold on the Dutch Republic.

This hymn "We Gather Together", which Americans associate with their Thanksgiving holiday, was actually written sometime in 1597 to celebrate Holland's freedom from Spain. It's author, an unknown Dutchman, was full of thanksgiving that his people were finally free from Spanish tyranny and free to worship as they chose. Notice how he expressed this theme in these three beautiful verses:

The wicked oppressing now cease from distressing...

... so from the beginning the fight we were winning; Thou, Lord, wast at our side, all glory be Thine!

We all do extol Thee, Thou Leader triumphant, And pray that thou still our defender wilt be. Let thy congregation escape tribulation: Thy Name be ever praised! O Lord, make us free!



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## **Methodist History**

#### Susanna Wesley



On January 20, 1669, on Spital Yard, a narrow court in London, Susanna Annesley was born. She was the youngest of 25 children. In her girlhood, she witnessed the dying embers of a fire of persecution of the non-conformists. "The Act of Uniformity" of 1662, required every clergyman to declare his unfeigned assent to <u>all</u> and <u>everything</u> contained and prescribed in the Book of Common Prayer. Her father, Dr. Annesley, was a minister, and on St. Bartholomew's Day, when the act went into effect, over 2,000 ministers bade farewell to their weeping congregations. They did

not dare to worship God according to other men's consciences! They were forbidden to live within 5 miles of any place where they had preached. They were forbidden to teach any school, public or private. Worshippers who attended any other than the established form, or ever received the dissenting ministers in their homes, were heavily fined or imprisoned. The enforcement of the Acts was committed to the King's Soldiers. Over 5,000 died in prison for disobeying. In such an England, Susanna Annesley was born.

After the penalties of the Act of Uniformity had been suspended in 1672, Dr. Annesley took the ministry of a dissenting church in London. His hospitable door welcomed all who knocked, and his flock numbered a full score of attractive daughters. Young Samuel Wesley was a favorite guest. He came and came again, perhaps because he found Dr. Anseley's conversation very satisfying, or perhaps he found his daughter a beautiful and delightful companion.

Early one August morning, Samuel Wesley trudged afoot to Oxford to prepare for the regular ministry. Five years later he was ordained a deacon, and later a priest. The year 1688 saw him settled as a curate. He and Susanna Annesley were married soon after she turned eighteen.

For 2 years after their marriage they lived in lodgings in London. Here their first child, Samuel, was born. However, all the while her husband, Samuel, was doing the work of a servant in Oxford, Susanna was growing up among cultured companions. She was early initiated and instructed in the first principles of the Christian Religion. In girlhood, she received from the heart the form of doctrine from her father's lips. Her own rule as a girl was never to spend more time per day in worldly pleasures than she was willing to spend in private devotions.

In 1690, Samuel received the rectory of South Ormsby, a little village in Lincolnshire. His thorough-going honesty always stood in the way of his material progress. Susanna managed their small income so well the family did keep out of debt.

For 7 years they lived in South Ormsby. The church itself was attractive enough, but the rectory was a hut composed of reeds and clay. Here they had only 50 pounds a year to live on, and one child additional per year. Yet no one complained. Each new comer was welcomed. Susanna was a thrifty wife, making food fill many mouths.



# **Living Our Faith**

### **Strangers No More**

Some people open their holiday meals to strangers, and one host even did so inadvertently. In 2016, Wanda Dench texted 17-year-old Jamal Hinton about Thanksgiving dinner, thinking she was contacting her grandson. When a skeptical Hinton requested a photo and received a selfie of someone with a different skin color, he chuckled but then asked if he could still come eat! Thus began a new friendship and a new annual tradition, which Hinton documents online. "Family is more than blood," says Dench. "It's the people you want to be with."

This year's meal will be bittersweet, with an empty chair for Dench's husband, who died of Covid-19 in April. To show support after that loss, Hinton sent his "grandma" a collection of loving video messages. Strangers worldwide expressed condolences to a woman who'd fully embraced a stranger.

## Growing Through Gratitude

Thankfulness, studies show, has multiple physical, mental and emotional benefits. Psychologist Robert Emmons calls gratitude "fertilizer for the mind" because of its powerful effects.

He admits gratitude isn't always easy especially when life throws us curveballs (see the year 2020) — but says it can be most helpful during and after difficulties. Emmons suggests reframing challenges using thankfulness-based language. Ask, for example: Though I wasn't grateful for the experience at the time, how can I be now? What lessons did I learn, and how did I grow as a person?

Throughout his letters, the apostle Paul reframes his extensive sufferings and urges us to do the same. "Give thanks in all circumstances," he writes, "for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus" (1 Thessalonians 5:18, NIV).

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
