

## Romania Vision Mission

Asha—that's good. One of the words from my 'Romania dictionary' written during my recent trip to Romania with "Volunteer Optometric Services to Humanity (VOSH)", and a word to cover lots of circumstances.

Asha: the group of around 30 people who flew from the USA and Canada to Targoviste and Gaesti, Romania. I was at Targoviste and enjoyed our North American Team immensely.


Asha: We were hosted by the Rotary of Targoviste, who provided our housing, food, translators, and support at the clinics where we saw 2,000 clients during our work week. The Gaesti team, saw 1,500 patients, so it was a busy week for all of us!

Asha, Asha (very good): The high school and college translators were EXCELLENT! Their English was almost perfect, and by the end of the week, I think the ones working my refractor station could have done everything themselves. I was reminded that kids are the same all over. The president's eleven-year-old daughter was my granddaughter's mirror image. We had lots of fun together. Some teenage girls were exactly like our high-school girls: giggly, always together in a group, and enjoying life. The older students, were more serious and very interested in life in the US and politics. We had deep discussions on Romania's past with communism and how our countries could work together.

Asha, Asha: we took a tour of this section of Romania, for the week after our clinic was over. The countryside was beautiful—roses EVERYWHERE! The 3<sup>rd</sup> heaviest building in the world, the Romanian Parliament (only the Pentagon and the pyramid in Giza are heavier). A wonderful living museum of traditional houses and buildings from every section of Romania. Dracula's birthplace (he's a hero in Romania, by the way) and Bran Castle, where the Dracula movie was made. (It is no wonder so many people died by falling down stairs in the novels—they are treacherous!) A ride through a pass in the Carpathian Mountains, where we saw 5 bears!

Most of all, as with every mission trip I go on, seeing the joy and gratitude of people when they receive glasses and can live their lives more fully, makes every tiring day a gift. A thing we take so lightly (200,000 pairs were processed at the VOSH recycling center last year) means work and education for every person we see, and because each one's life is better, the lives of their children and grandchildren are also better.

## **Hymn History**

#### I'll Fly Away

"Then Sings My Soul" Book 2, By Robert J. Morgan

#### 1932

Therefore you now have sorrow; but I will see you again and your heart will rejoice, and your joy no one will take from you. John 16:22 (NKJV)

I could tell you this old southern hymn was written by a sacred soul on his knees with Psalm 90 open before him: "The days of our lives are seventy years; and if by reason of strength they are eighty years, yet their only boast is labor and sorrow; for it is soon cut off, and we fly away."

The truth, however, is a little plainer.

Albert E. Brumley was born on a cotton farm near Spiro, Oklahoma, in 1905. The medium of radio was gaining popularity as he grew up, and one of the most requested songs was a sad ballad called 'If I Had the Wings of an Angel' which said:

Now if I had the wings of an angel, Over these prison walls I would fly away, I would fly to the arms of my poor darling, And there I would be willing to die.

One hot Oklahoma day, Albert was in the fields picking cotton and singing this song. The thought of flying away suddenly seemed quite appealing to him, and he began composing "I'll Fly Away" on the spot. I was dreaming of flying away from the cotton field when I wrote 'I'll Fly Away,' " he later said. The middle verse of Albert's song echoes the old prison ballad when it says:

When the shadows of this life have grown, I'll fly away; Like a bird from prison bars has flown, I'll Fly Away.

Of course, "I'll Fly Away" is about far more than escaping cotton fields. It expressed Brumley's personal hope of eternal life through Jesus Christ. It was one of a number of gospel songs he wrote during those days, but all of them were stashed away in drawers and boxes unpublished.


Two years later, Albert married Goldie Schell, whom he met while teaching a singing school in Powell, Missouri. With her encouragement, Albert mailed "I'll Fly Away" to the Hartford Music Company. It was published in 1932, and shortly afterward, Albert was hired by Hartford for \$12.50 a month. He spent thirty-four years writing for the Hartford and Stamps/Baxter companies before forming the Albert E. Brumley & Sons Music Company. In all, Albert wrote over eight hundred songs and became one of the most respected names in the development of twentieth-century Southern gospel music.

# Featured Recipes from St. Paul's Great Cooks

## **Pumpkin Pecan Bundt Cake**

#### By Susan Nartker

| Ingredients |                           |
|-------------|---------------------------|
| CAKE:       |                           |
| 1 box       | Yellow cake mix           |
| 3/4 cup     | Pumpkin, canned           |
| 1/2 cup     | Water                     |
| 1/2 cup     | Vegetable oil             |
| 3           | Eggs                      |
| 1 1/2 tsp.  | Cinnamon, ground          |
| 1/2 tsp.    | Ginger, ground            |
| 1/2 tsp.    | Nutmeg, ground            |
| 3/4 cup     | Pecans, chopped           |
| GLAZE:      |                           |
| 2 Tbl.      | Butter                    |
| 1/4 cup     | Brown Sugar, packed       |
| 1/8 tsp.    | Nutmeg, ground            |
| 1/4 cup     | Heavy Whipping Cream      |
| 2/3 cup     | Powdered sugar            |
| 1/2 tsp.    | Vanilla                   |
| 2 Tbl.      | Pecans, toasted & chopped |

#### Cake:

Instructions

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Generously spray bundt cake pan with baking spray with flour.

In large bowl, beat cake, pumpkin, water, oil, eggs, cinnamon, ginger and 1/2 tsp. nutmeg with electric mixer on medium speed for 2 minutes., scraping bowl occasionally.

Stir in 3/4 cup Pecans. Pour into pan.

Bake 35 to 40 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean.

Remove from oven. Let stand 20 minutes, remove from pan to cooling rack. Cool completely, about 1 hour.

#### Glaze:

In 1-quart saucepan, cook butter, brown sugar, 1/8 tsp. nutmeg, and whipping cream over medium heat until mixture comes to a boil. Boil 1 minute.

Remove from heat, pour into medium bowl. Cool for 20 minutes. With whisk, beat in powdered sugar and vanilla until smooth. Immediately pour over cake. Sprinkle 2 Tbl. Pecan on top. Store loosely covered at room temperature.





## KIDZ KORNER



Celebrate the season of gratitude by creating a colorful Thankful decoration

#### What you need:

- Construction paper in a variety of fall colors
- · Pencil, marker, or crayons
- · Yarn, ribbon, or raffia
- Scissors
- · Hole punch
- Spray bottle filled with water
- · Real leaves (Optional)
- Wooden or plastic beads, (1) (5) cereal with holes (Cheerios, (6) Froot Loops, etc.), or any dried pasta with a hole (Optional)

#### What you do:

- Draw or trace leaf shapes onto construction paper.
- Lay the paper flat and spray with water until the paper is completely wet.
- Crumple the wet paper into balls.
- Open the paper and let the sheets dry flat.
- 5. When dry, cut out each leaf.
- On each leaf, write the name of one person or thing you're thankful for.
- 7. Punch a hole in each leaf.
- Lace the leaves, beads, cereal, and pasta onto the yarn, ribbon, or raffia.
- 9. Tie the ends and hang your garland.







## **Living Our Faith**

#### Take Me to the River

God often works in unexpected ways. Just ask Naaman, the army commander in 2 Kings 5:1-14. Stricken with leprosy, he traveled to Israel seeking healing from the prophet Elisha. Instead of an impressive display or a grand ceremony, Elisha sent word for him to simply wash seven times in the Jordan River.

Naaman was not impressed. "Aren't the rivers of Damascus better than all the waters of Israel?" he asked. Why bathe in a foreign, muddy river when the clean, sparkling rivers of home were far more appealing? It didn't make sense. Yet what seemed absurd became the very path to his healing.

We may not be told to wade into an actual river, but we all face "Jordan moments" in life — times when God calls us to take a step that feels uncomfortable, humbling or completely illogical. It is in those moments that trust and obedience matter most.

Naaman's story reminds us that God's power is not limited by appearances or human reasoning. Sometimes the action that feels least likely to work is the one that opens the door to blessing. When God invites you to take the plunge, step into the water. You may find healing and hope waiting there.
