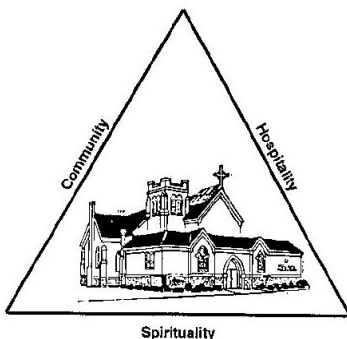

If you are anything like me, sometimes you feel overwhelmed, that is normal, but thankfully we believe in God who helps us through those difficult times. Starting on October 10<sup>th</sup>, I will be sharing with you a series of sermons about how God calls us to Catch Our Breath. When we are exhausted, when we are afraid, when we have doubt, when we grieve, in our loneliness, and during a time of loss, we can count on God to be with us and help us through all those situations. I hope you will join me for this series, in person or online, so we can look at how God helps us through and helps us Catch Our Breath.

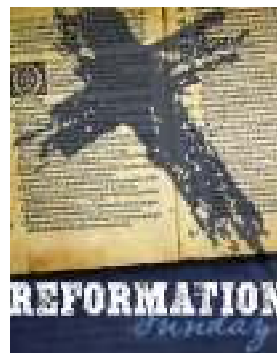

# Prayer

## The Lion of Judah

In the ways things happen, I started reviewing Intimate Intercessor by *Trisha McCary Rhodes*, for this month's thoughts, and the chapter I am reading refers to the start of the war in Afghanistan, the same month we ended the war in Afghanistan, twenty years later. While I am NOT opening this up for a political discussion, one idea arose from both times: What constitutes victory? What were/are our aims for the war? This is also a valid question for our intercessory prayers.

War is a way of life in many parts of the world. Death, destruction, and persecution are daily experiences of many. Yet, it is in these parts of the world that the Christian faith is growing fastest. Perhaps these Christians see the real evil and the faith that Christ has the last word over what evil makes "belief" a reality. In these parts of the world, Jesus may be, love, but he is also the warrior, and God of the Psalms, who strikes down enemies. He is real enough to argue with God in other Psalms and yet, bow to His will. These Christians have a clear idea of what victory in Jesus is.

What constitutes "victory" in prayer? We pray for specific needs for people, but did we "win" the prayer when the needs are met, or are met differently, than we prayed for. If not, why keep doing this? I must admit, this is often my question. If God is going to answer the prayer the way He wants, why should I pray?

Some say that we are in a war with Satan and evil. Others say the battles are within our own spirits and thoughts. Either way, we need to take a stand. We need to declare our aims and stand up for our goals. Fortunately, we do not have to feel alone. We have a champion to lead the way: Jesus Christ. We often talk about Jesus and His loving, gentle, and even non-violent responses to the situations he faced in life on earth. We don't talk as much about Jesus as THE LION OF JUDAH, the OVERCOMER of EVIL, the KING! This Jesus appeared to John on the Isle of Patmos with "eyes piercing flames of fire, mouth wielding a two-edged sword, face shining so brightly that the sun looks dim by comparison" (Intimate Intercessions, p. 112). The Triune God has a banner of love, but He wages a war against sin of all forms.

We may not know what to pray, or how to pray, or when to pray, or if to pray, but we do know that we have a magnificent leader in the Lion of Judah, and He will use us, and our prayers, to enable those for whom we are praying resist the very real power of evil and sin, and come to Him who is Love, personified.

Join me on Sunday mornings at 9:30 a.m., in the Prayer Room (aka The Bride's Room) at the top of the west stairs by the front entrance. We pray by naming those on our prayer list, so you will not be asked to pray aloud or alone.



# Hymn History

## Shall We Gather at the River?

"Then Sings My Soul" Book 1, By Robert J. Morgan

1864

*"And he showed me a pure river of water of life, clear as crystal, proceeding from the throne of God and of the Lamb" Revelation 22:1*

Often called the "Good Doctor," Robert Lowry was a cheerful man with a big beard and quick mind. He pastored Baptist churches in the Eastern U.S. during the mid 1800s. One friend said, "Very few men had greater ability in painting pictures from imagination. He could thrill an audience with his vivid descriptions, inspiring them with the same thoughts that inspired him."

But he was best remembered for his hymns. Even in childhood he had composed tunes, and as he became acquainted with leaders in American hymnology—many of them based in New York—he realized he could reach more people through his songs than through sermons.

He set many of Fanny Crosby's hymns to music, including the classic, "All the Way My Savior Leads Me." And he wrote both words and music to the popular gospel song: "What can wash away my sins? / Nothing but the blood of Jesus."

The doctors best known hymn is "Shall We Gather at the River?" Though often used at baptisms, it's actually a song about heaven. It came to Lowry on a mid-summer's day in New York, when, in the sweltering heat, he began musing about the cool, crystal river that flows through the city of God as described in Revelation 22.

*One afternoon in July, 1864, when I was pastor at Hanson Place Baptist Church, Brooklyn, the weather was oppressively hot, and I was lying on a lounge in the state of physical exhaustion. I felt almost incapable of bodily exertion, and my imagination began to take itself wings. Visions of the future passed before me with startling vividness. The imagery of the apocalypse took the form of a tableau. Brightest of all were the throne, the heavenly river, and the gathering of the saints. My soul began to take new life from the celestial outlook. I began to wonder why The hymn writers had said so much about the "river of death" and so little about the "pure water of life, clear as crystal, proceeding out of the throne of God and the Lamb." As I mused, the words began to construct themselves. They came first as a question of Christian inquiry, "Shall we gather?" Then they broke out in a chorus, Yes, we'll gather." On this question and answer the hymn developed itself. The music came with the hymn.*

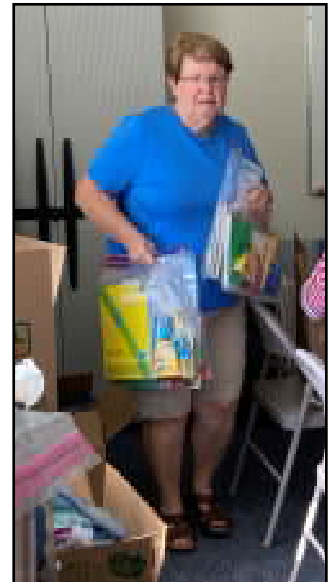

## Peanut Butter Honey Brownies

Ingredients		Instructions
3/4 cup	Peanut butter, creamy	Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease 9 inch pan.  In small bowl, combine honey and peanut butter until smooth. Set aside.
1/2 cup	Honey	
1 (15.5 oz.)	Brownie mix, chocolate chunk	In large bowl, combine brownie mix, 1/3 cup oleo, water, and egg. Beat 50 strokes. Spread half of batter into pan. Score batter into 16 squares. Place a scant teaspoon of honey mixture onto each square.
1/3 cup	Oleo (margarine), melted	
3 Tbl.	Water	Carefully spread remaining batter over top and bake for 30 to 35 minutes.
1	Egg	
3/4 cup	Chocolate chips, semi-sweet	Cool for 45 minutes. Spread remaining honey mixture over baked brownies.  In small pan, combine chocolate chips and butter until melted and smooth. Spoon over honey mixture.
3 Tbl.	Oleo, softened	
		Cool another 45 minutes and refrigerate.

### Going to Extremes

When a herd of elephants ventured into a town in eastern India, people chased them away. But soon they learned that a baby elephant had fallen into a 30-foot well and been left behind. Workers had to use three backhoes to free the calf, breaking down the brick well and digging a sloping trench for the youngster to walk out on.

Righting a wrong — and even saving a life — may require extreme measures. A structure holding someone captive may need to be torn down. And in many cases, it's better to allow the trapped one as much independence and agency as possible. Rather than hoisting the elephant out vertically, which might have been dangerous and traumatic, helpers made a path so it could take part in attaining its freedom.

God often works like this, restoring and equipping us to partner with him. How can we assist others while granting them the dignity of being part of the solution?
