

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October is here, and things are moving along both time and news. We are launching online giving to Elida St. Paul's on the 1^{st} of the month. The next few sentences are going to be about online giving and if you don't want to use it, skip to the next paragraph. We have contracted with Vanco, an online giving company, to

handle our online giving. They are a pass-through company for nonprofit companies that only charges us fees if there is giving. If no one gives online we have no fees, if you decide to give online, St Paul's is charged 2.25% and \$0.30 per transaction for debit/credit cards, or 0.5% and \$0.30 per transaction for ACH (checking transfer). You will have the option of giving one time or setting up a recurring giving on a weekly, every 2 weeks, twice a month (1st & 15th), monthly, quarterly, or annually. If you wish, you can choose to give an extra 3% to cover credit/debit costs or 1% to cover ACH costs. If you enjoy automatic online bill pay, I hope you will consider giving online to Elida St. Paul's, if you are here one Sunday and have forgotten your checkbook, or have no cash, you can give online quickly via your phone, or if you are an online viewer this is your chance to be a faithful giver to Elida St. Paul's. Thank you for your continued faithfulness in giving to the church and continuing the mission of Christ at St. Paul's.

Halloween is also soon at hand, and we will once again be doing Trunk-or-Treat here at St. Paul's. We hand out hot chocolate to the trick or treaters, and you have a chance to park your car and hand out candy to the kids as they are trick or treating. Elida normally celebrates the Thursday before Halloween, which would be the 26th of October, so pencil it in your calendar. If the date is different, we will announce it in the Weekly Word and the announcements on Sunday. Not available, but still want to be a part of this ministry? You can donate individually wrapped candy to the office, and we will make sure it gets handed out to the kiddos. If you are handing out candy and wonder how many kids we normally see, the answer is about 300, what a chance we have to share God's love for families here in Elida.





Hymn History

I Surrender All

"Then Sings My Soul" Book 1, By Robert J. Morgan

1896

"But now, O Lord, You are our Father; we are the clay, and you our Potter; and all we are the work of Your hand." Isaiah 64:8

Someone once said, "Only in the Christian life does surrender bring victory." Judson Wheeler Van De Venter learned that himself.


Born on a farm in Monroe Country, Michigan, in 1885, Judson grew up interested in art and music. He was converted to Christ at age 17. After graduating from college in Hillsdale, Michigan, Judson became an art teacher and then a supervisor of art for the high school in Sharon, Pennsylvania. In 1885, he toured Europe, visiting art galleries and museums and studying painting. He was also a musician, having studied in numerous singing schools.

All the while, Judson was heavily involved in his local Methodist Episcopal Church where he sang in the choir. He found himself especially fulfilled when participating in evangelistic rallies and revivals in which people received Christ as their personal Savior. Friends encouraged him to resign from the school system to enter full time evangelism, but for 5 years he struggled with decision.

Finally falling to his knees, he said "Lord, if you want me to give my full time to Thy work, I'll do it, I surrender all to Thee." For the next several years he traveled extensively through the United States, England, and Scotland, assisting in evangelical work, leading the singing for Wilber Chapman and other evangelists, and winning men and women to Christ.

While engaging in meetings in East Palestine, Ohio, Judson stayed in the home of George Sebring (whose family founded Sebring, Ohio, and who himself later founded Sebring, Florida). It was there that he wrote the hymn, "I Surrender All," while recalling his own personal submitting to full-time ministry.

Moving to Tampa in 1923, he began teaching hymnology at Florida Bible Institute. He retired after several years, but still occasionally showed up on campus to lecture or to speak in chapel. In the 1930s, a student at Florida Bible Institute sat wide-eyed, listening to Judson Van De Venter. That student, Billy Graham, later wrote: "One of the evangelist who influenced my early preaching was also a hymnist who wrote: "I Surrender All,' the Rev. J. W. Van De Venter. He was a regular visitor at the Florida Bible Institute (now Trinity Bible College) in the late 1930s. We students loved this kind, deeply spiritual gentleman and often gathered in his winter home at Tampa, Florida, for an evening of fellowship and singing."




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Quilts



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
Creamsicle Cookies

Ingredients		Instructions
1/2 cup	Butter, softened	Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Line cookie sheet with parchment paper.
8 oz.	Cream Cheese, softened Egg	In large mixing bowl, beat together butter, orange extract, cream cheese, and egg, until smooth. Add cake mix and mix well.
1/2 tsp.	Orange extract	*optional* Add orange food coloring to desired color. Stir white chocolate chips into cookie dough. Chill
1 box	Orange cake mix (Duncan Hines)	dough in refrigerator for 30 minutes.
* 1 drop (optional)	Orange food coloring to desired color	 Form dough into balls, roll into powdered sugar, place onto cookie sheet.
1 cup	White chocolate chips	Bake at 350 degrees for 12-13 minutes, they will be a little soft. Do Not overbake. Cool 2 -3 minutes then
1 cup	Powdered sugar	remove from pan.

Caramel Apple Crisp

Ingredien	its	By Susan Nartker Instructions
3 cups	Oats, old-fashioned	In large bowl, combine oats, flour, brown sugar, and cinnamon; cut in butter until crumbly.
2 cups	Flour, all-purpose	Press half of the mixture into a greased 13x9 in. baking
1 1/2 cups	Brown sugar, packed	dish. Layer with half of the apples, caramels and 1 cup oat mixture. Repeat layers. Pour 1/2 cup cider over top.
1 tsp.	Cinnamon, ground	Bake the crisp, uncovered at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.
1 cup	Butter, cold & cubed	Drizzle with remaining cider; bake 15-20 minutes longer or until apples are tender.
8 cups	Apples, tart peeled & thinly sliced	
1 pkg. (14 oz.)	Caramels, halved	
1 cup	Apple cider, divided

Living Our Faith

Starting A Ripple Effect

Shortly before his death, 80-year-old farmer Hody Childress asked his daughter to continue a practice he'd quietly conducted for years: taking a \$100 bill to a local pharmacist on the first of every month. For years, Childress anonymously came to the aid of neighbors in Geraldine, Alabama, who couldn't afford medications. "Don't tell a soul where the money came from," he instructed store owner Brooke Walker. "If they ask, just tell them it's a blessing from the Lord."

Thanks to the farmer's generosity, Walker could fill prescriptions for about 24 uninsured or underinsured people each year. "I was honored he allowed me to do that," she said, "and it really encouraged me to do the same in my life."

Childress wasn't wealthy but "always gave what he could," said daughter Tania Nix. "I think he felt like he couldn't not give," she added. "Giving that way, that just got on his heart." After word spread about Childress' generosity, other people were inspired to perform stealth outreach and a fund was established in his name.

A man in Oklahoma who shares Childress' surname said a story about the farmer caught his attention. They're probably not related, he wrote, but he'd feel proud if they were. "A man like that surely tried to follow the example of Jesus," the Oklahoman wrote, and "[his] story inspires me to be a better man."
