

Hymn History

Come, Christians, Join to Sing

"Then Sings My Soul" Book 2, By Robert J. Morgan

1843

Serve the Lord with gladness; Come before His presence with singing. Psalm 100:2

Many of our "adult" hymns were originally written for children. "Savior, like a Shepherd Lead Us," is a good example. So is Isaac Watts' great hymn, "I Sing the Mighty Power of God," which first appeared in his *Divine and Moral Songs for Children*. The rousing "Onward, Christian Soldiers" was written for the youngsters of Horbury, England, to sing on a Monday morning in 1865 as they marched to a nearby village to establish a Sunday School. Even the great anthem "All Creatures of Our God and King," by St. Francis of Assisi, was first translated into English and set to music for a 1919 children's festival in Leeds, England.

Here's another instance: "Come, Christians, Join to Sing" first appeared in *Sacred Melodies for Children*, published in Edinburgh in 1843. The original words said, "Come, Children, Join to Sing..."

Its author, Christian Henry Bateman, a pastor in Edinburgh, was committed to developing a Sunday School in which children sang the great truths of the Christian faith. Bateman had begun his ministry as a Moravian pastor, but moved to Edinburgh and became a Congregational minister and the pastor of Richmond Place Congregational Church, where he was serving when he wrote "Come, Christians, Join to Sing." He was later ordained in the Church of England and ministered in that communion until his retirement in 1884. He passed away 5 years later.

"Come, Christians, join to Sing" originally had 5 stanzas, but Bateman reduced the hymn to its present form in the 1854 edition of his hymnal, *Sacred Melodies for Sabbath Schools and Families*. This book became one of the best-selling songbooks in Scottish history, selling more than six million copies by 1881 and becoming the standard hymn book for Scottish Sunday schools for a generation.

The true, MADRID, was a popular Spanish folk melody arranged for this hymn by Benjamin Carr, who was born in London in 1769, and died in Philadelphia in 1831. In England, Carr was a well-known singer with the London Ancient Concerts. Immigrating to America, he joined his father and brother in a music publishing enterprise, with stores in Philadelphia, New York, and Baltimore. He also served as a church organist and music director in Philadelphia for many years. Benjamin Carr is best known as the first American Publisher of "Yankee Doodle" - and for arranging the music to "come, Christians, Join to Sing."

Methodist History

Early Methodist Meetinghouses In Ohio

The next Methodist meetinghouse was the one erected at Hopewell. Rev. William I. Fee, in speaking of his grandfather, says, "in the year 1803, he united with a number of pioneer Methodists who had moved from Maryland and Virginia to Clermont County to erect the third Methodist Episcopal Church edifice in the Northwest Territory. It was named the Hopewell. It stood one mile west of Felicity. It was a hewed log building, two stories high, and a very large edifice for that day."

Ward's meetinghouse was erected that same year. It was located on Duck Creek, Hamilton County, near Madisonville. It was built, as were most of the churches of this day, of rough beech logs. About this time, a log meetinghouse was also erected on Eagle Creek, in Scioto Circuit.

gospel to the four corners of the earth. This cross is often used in connection with missions.








A BUSHEL OF Design a handy bag to tote your books this fall. What you need:

- 1. Lay the bag flat on a table, and place cardboard inside for protection.
- 2. Pour a paint dollop on each plate.
- 3. Slice the apple in half, keeping the core intact.
- 4. Brush a thin layer of paint on the cut side of an apple half. Practice making stamps on scrap paper.
 Use the other color on the other apple half.
- Paint and stamp the bag with your final design. When dry, remove the cardboard.
- 6. Use the bag for school and Sunday school. Happy reading!

One All-Important Word

Sometimes one word makes all the difference. In John 14:16, when Jesus promises the disciples that God will send the Holy Spirit, he doesn't say "the" Helper or "a" Helper but "another" Helper. For there to be "another" of something, we must already be familiar with a first of that thing. Jesus has been, for the disciples, their first Helper. They already "know him for he dwells with [them]" (verse 17, ESV).

When my infant son was to start full-time daycare, the transition went quite smoothly. That's because his "new" caregiver wasn't new at all: She was Grandma! The sense that my son would be in the hands of *another* family member he already knew eased the handoff for Mama and baby alike.

Not all parents have access to that type of situation, but the caregiving arrangement Jesus provided his disciples is available to all. Even when Jesus is no longer physically with us, another who loves us just as much — another we already know and whose truth we've seen in Jesus — is here. We're in good hands.
