
St. Paul's Epistle An Inviting Community of Christ's Disciples

How Will We Use Our Freedom?

In 2000, Cornealious Anderson was sentenced to 13 years for robbery. The 23-year-old was released on bail and told to await orders to show up to prison. But due to a clerical error, those orders never came. Some people might have taken advantage of such freedom and committed more crimes. But Anderson started a business, coached youth football and volunteered at church, earning respect in his community.

Thirteen years later, when Missouri officials discovered the error and put Anderson behind bars, an online petition called for his release. A judge agreed that Anderson was a changed man and, again, he was freed.

What would *you* do with such undeserved freedom? What *do* we do with the unmerited freedom God grants us despite our sin, and with the freedoms we celebrate on July 4? May we follow Anderson's example and use our freedoms — social *and* spiritual — to serve others.

JERUSALEM CROSS

This complex cross, also called the Crusader's Cross or Fivefold Cross, has several interpretations. The main cross is composed of four tau

(T) crosses representing the Old Testament law. The four small Greek crosses symbolize the fulfillment of the law in the gospel. The five crosses together represent the church's mission: to spread the gospel to the four corners of the earth. They're also said to symbolize Christ's five wounds (hands, feet and side).

Returning to Worship

Return to Worship Guidelines

Elida St Paul's United Methodist Church will reopen on June 28th for 10am worship. Our leadership has put together the policy below to help keep us safe as we gather for worship. These guidelines will evolve as our response to the pandemic changes.

- If you feel ill or have a fever, please do not come to church.
- Masks are encouraged but NOT required.
- Hand sanitizer and masks will be available at each entrance.
- Please use social distancing in the sanctuary. We are not closing rows, but are asking that you maintain a 6 feet distance between families.
- There will be no greeters, ushers or hospitality cart.
- Offering plates will be available at each entrance. Please place your offering in the plate.
- The nursery will be open for your use, but will not have an attendant.
- There will be no Sunday School (for now).
- We will have a Hymn Leader singing, but the congregation will not sing.
- There will be no responsive reading or opening prayer by the congregation.
- We will have communion with prepackaged single serve wafer and juice the first Sunday of each month.
- Disinfectant wipes will be available in the north bathrooms.
- Bulletins will not be used, but a weekly prayer list will be available in the pews.
- We will not have Children's Moments.
- We are asking that all socializing before and after church occur outside, and that you maintain a safe social distance.



History of a Hymn

The Star-Spangled Banner

"Then Sings My Soul", By Robert J. Morgan

1814

For our citizenship is in heaven, from which we also eagerly wait for the Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ. Philippians 3:20

It was a deadly September attack on America. Casualties on our own shores. The nation's capitol targeted. The White House in danger. Terror. Heroes.

One hero was Francis, a Georgetown attorney heavily involved in national politics. An evangelical Christian, Francis taught Bible classes and witnessed boldly, once telling a friend in Congress, "Christ alone can save you from the sentence of Condemnation."

He also wrote hymns like this one:

Lord, with glowing heart I'd praise thee, / For the bliss Thy love bestows, / For the pardoning grace that saves me, / And the peace that from it flows; / Help, O God, my weak endeavor; / This dull soul to rapture raise;

Thou must light the flame, or never

Can my love be warmed to praise.

But nothing prepared Francis for the hostage-recovery mission he undertook at the request of the President of the United States. He was seeking the release of a prominent physician, Dr. Beanes, who had been taken captive. During that assignment he was detained by enemy troops and forced to watch a brutal assault on the eastern seaboard.

Toward the morning of September 14, 1814, when it became clear that American forces had withstood the 25-hour bombardment, Francis Scott Key penned another hymn, scribbling it on the back of an envelope. The first stanza we all know, but have you ever sung the last stanza of "The Star-Spangled Banner"?

Blest with victory and peace, may the heaven-rescued land Praise the Power that hath made and preserved as a nation!

Then conquer we must when our cause it is just.

And this be our motto: "In God is our trust."

And the star-spangled banner in triumph shall wave

O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave.

After sunrise, the British released Francis, and back in Baltimore he wrote out this hymn in fuller form and showed it to his brother-in-law who promptly gave it to a printer who ran off handbills for distribution on the streets. One copy landed in the hands of an unknown musician who adapted it to the tune "To Anacreon in Heaven." So was born the patriotic hymn that was to become our national anthem.





This experiment illustrates that although God is invisible, we can see his work all around us.



What you do:

The "Wow!" Factor

After the final notes concluded at a recent symphony performance in Boston, the conductor hadn't yet lowered his baton when a child exclaimed, "Wow!" The break in protocol, magnified by excellent acoustics, didn't upset the participants or audience, however. Instead, several later said it brought them great joy. One even called the moment life-changing.

The incident was especially meaningful because the child, a 9-year-old named Ronan, has autism and is generally nonverbal. Music, his family says, tends to attract his interest and make him happy. When symphony officials learned Ronan's identity, they arranged a private performance so he could meet some musicians.

How often do you shout "Wow!" — in a good way — at what you see and hear? You may tend to do so on vacation or while observing God's natural wonders, but what about during your day-to-day life? Think about the people you encounter and their talents — and your own. When have these sparked a "Wow!" of thanks to God?

Every blessing, large or small, is a wow-moment — a gift from God that warrants our praise.
