Bring a white candle in a holder to place on the altar in memory of loved ones who have passed.






Christian Symbol:

CIRCLE

Stewardship season and Commitment Sunday are upon us again. You can set your calendar to the events and activities of St. Paul's congregation and its Koinonia Group a fellow St. Paul's parishioner chuckled during a recent meeting.

Stewardship means 'the responsible oversight and protection of something considered worth caring for and preserving.' Matthew 6:21 says, "For where your treasure is, there will be your heart also." There is no doubt that the members of St. Paul's U.M.C. treasure and are passionately connected to their church institution. Need evidence? Ask Ron Steiner or Art Holman to recite some church history both from their personal and group experiences. But listen closely. Their recitations really describe people spiritually motivated to action. Combine such motivation with a healthy dose of commitment and you experience stewardship in action at St. Paul's!

What motivates you? I like this question better than 'what are your goals?' or 'what do you dream?' It speaks to a person's character with 'character' being defined as the value a person places upon him/herself. At times I answer this question by stating 'making sure my end of the ship isn't sinking.' While this may sound self-centered, I'm really describing traits of accountability, responsibility, doing the right thing, or making a difference.

Galatians 6:9 says, "Let us not become weary in doing good for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up." As Christians and members of St. Paul's, aren't we committed to doing good and motivated to do the right things as effectively and responsibly as possible? While a bit of a rhetorical question, one only needs to consider stewardship in action at St. Paul's for the answer:

- The commitment of the Board of Trustees in caring for our buildings and grounds;
- The hard work and dedication of our musicians, choir, and music director in their music ministry;
- Our missions outreach whether through our Missions Committee or otherwise;
- Our Nurture Committee and service to our members;
- Activities implementing our Vision Statement through commitments to youth and senior citizens at St. Paul's and in our community;
- Christian Education programs and activities;
- Our Worship Committee and Sunday Fellowship Hour facilitators.

What motivates you? Stewardship season and Commitment Sunday ask you to provide a portion of the financial resources necessary for the 'oversight and protection' of that which we consider worthy of protection and preservation: St. Paul's United Methodist Church, Elida. Commitment Sunday is **November 23, 2014** and is your opportunity to act monetarily upon that which motivates you at St. Paul's. See you in church.

EASY is off and running!

Yes, folks, it's a beautiful time for the running of the EASY program! We have a full roster of racers (students)! While some of the 35 students registered haven't found the starting gate yet, each race day has seen around 25 participants. They are filling our tables with their energy and yearning for love and attention. We are only beginning to sort them out by names, faces, and personalities. Some are returnees, many are first-timers. Like any good horse trainer, we are finding out whom they can be next to, who needs quiet, who are leaders. We know they all need love.

So here is our problem: we need more adults to share time and love and talent! Our current, limited number of volunteers are a dedicated group but no one can be at EASY every day. When someone is gone, we are stretched thin. We need "parents" to sit and do homework. If you haven't looked at science since Pluto was a planet, we have volunteers available to fill in the gaps. Most of the time however, the kids need people to help them stay on track and be sure they put their answers in the right blanks. They need people to listen to their news of school. They need people to eat snacks with them.

We are also in need of volunteers to share skills for a couple weeks at a time in helping lead interest groups. If you can: play chess or card games, sew, knit, crochet, weave, do carpentry or craft projects, cook, scrapbook, wire a lamp, play music, color pictures, share a travel experience, demonstrate how to braid hair, work on engines, do home repairs, refinish furniture, have outdoor interests, garden, arrange flowers, make wreaths, make pinecone decorations, make greeting cards..... Whatever you enjoy, we can create an interest group.





The Promise of Beatitude



In Matthew 5, Jesus speaks of beatitude. Joy. That gets our attention. We all want to feel better about life. If somebody promises a method for happiness, serenity or satisfaction, there's always a ready audience.

Religion is not immune to culture. Bootstraps religion assumes that happiness is the reward for performance. It is the outcome of virtue, cleverness, and industry.

In fact, the beatitudes are on a collision course with our sensibilities and our culture. Jesus declares that the persecuted, the meek, and the peacemakers are the ones who are truly blessed. So just who are these blessed ones? Jesus mentions the "poor in spirit" (Mt 5:3), the ones who, despite any appearances to the contrary, do not have what it takes, who are impoverished materially or spiritually. Only the poor in spirit who know their impoverishment, who cast themselves on God's mercy and provision, are blessed.

Truth is, there are no self-made persons in the kingdom. Any real accomplishment in our lives is the result of God's grace. To know that is to know beatitude.

"Blessed are those who mourn" says Matthew 5:4. Mourning may be experienced in different forms. It may be a deep sorrow over the loss of someone dear. It may be lament over the hurt of the world as it is. God's people see things not only as they are, but also as they should be. In the midst of our mourning, we are promised beatitude.

The meek and those who hunger and thirst for righteousness have much in common. To be meek in the biblical sense is to recognize one's complete dependence on God. Those who are meek hunger and thirst for right relationships, not only with God, but also with others in society. This longing for righteousness and justice in human relationships motivates them to work and pray to that end.

When Jesus pronounces blessing on the merciful, he is not rewarding good behavior. He describes the one who, having tasted God's mercy, shows it toward others.

The sixth beatitude about the pure in heart speaks about the seat of one's innermost life. The pure in heart are undivided in their devotion to God. This may seem an impossible dream, and it is for sinners this side of Eden. That's why, in the presence of Jesus as he speaks these words to us, we hunger and thirst for righteousness.

The peacemakers of Jesus' pronouncement are those who work for healing and wholeness in creation and in society. Peace – shalom in the Hebrew – carries this sense of well being. God's people are not called simply to possess the right political perspective or philosophy of human relationships. As Tom Long says, "Peacemakers work to halt wars among nations as well as seeking harmony in personal relationships."

People who labor for peace and justice are not going to find a long line of well-wishers. Yet Jesus says, "Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake" (Mt 5:10). The movers and shakers who gain their power through exploitation will not take kindly to those who call for equity. The ninth and final beatitude makes a similar point.

It might be tempting to see the beatitudes as a description of how to be different; nine steps to being a counter-cultural Christian blessed by Jesus. No. Jesus sits in front of a rag-tag band of unworthy disciples and he pronounces them blessed. His words – his beatitudes – are performative acts. They effect what they signify. They bring into being that which they declare.

Jesus Christ, God's eternal Son, has the power to make what he says be true. In your poverty of spirit, your lament over injustice, and your working for peace, Jesus is your strong companion. On your journey, he walks alongside you, comforting, forgiving, strengthening, and most of all, blessing. Blessed are you.


Ingredients		Instructions
