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
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A Letter to My Children:

I write this as I am in the midst of preparing a sermon in celebration of the 50th wedding anniversary of a couple at St. Paul's, Norm and Mary Grigsby. In studying to find what words of wisdom I might possibly offer them since they've proven the steadfastness and faithfulness of their marriage covenant all these years, I've also been thinking about the beginnings of love, in all of it's youth and innocence. These thoughts have come especially since I've been in discussion with one of you about the trials and tribulations of your teen learning by trial and error how to relate to friends of the opposite gender.

In my reading, I ran across, again, the definitions of the four kinds of love mentioned in the Bible in *Love Never Ends* by Robert H. and Jeanette C. Lauer, and I thought it might be helpful as you try to explain and teach your children who are going through these painful, exciting, sometimes joyful, and always confusing years. I've paraphrased what the Lauer's wrote:

'Love is a basic need. As creatures who were created by the God who is Love because of God's need and desire to love, we too have a need to express love to another. It's a part of our divine image. But we use love to express a great many kinds of feelings and opinions. The ancient Greeks had four different words to indicate the different kinds of love.

First, there's *eros*, which at first meant the excitement and attraction that comes from outer appearance. The New Testament refers to this type of love as "lust." But, in the Song of Solomon, you can read about this kind of love as expressed by a husband to his wife. This is the kind of love that raging hormones results in adolescence, is often called a "crush," and is even mistaken for love that lasts

Bishop Ough Reappointed to West Ohio Conference of the United Methodist Church.

The North Central Jurisdiction Committee on Episcopacy has announced the appointment of Bishop Bruce R. Ough to the West Ohio Conference of the United Methodist Church.

Bishop Ough, along with his wife, Char, have faithfully served in West Ohio for the last eight years, and will return for another quadrennium as the spiritual leader for more than 230,000 United Methodists in 1,188 congregations in 58 Ohio counties. Within each jurisdiction, a committee on episcopacy consists of one clergy and one lay person from each annual conference. The committee is responsible for reviewing the work and character of the bishops, and the committee assigns the bishops to their areas. The jurisdictional conference has the authority to affirm or reject the assignments. If the conference rejects the assignments, the committee must make new assignments. The assignment for bishops elected at the 2008 jurisdictional conferences becomes effective Sept. 1, 2008.





Organizing for Leadership

ST. PAUL'S MEN HOST UNITED METHODIST MEN'S BREAKFAST

On Saturday, September 6th, St. Paul's Church hosted the Lima Area Methodist Men's (LAMM) breakfast. Jamie Wyant greeted those participating. Bill McKinney offered a devotional and prayer. After eating a hearty breakfast provided by the St. Paul's men (with some help from their wives), Jamie moderated discussion by those present. Norm Grigsby gave a treasurer's report for the group. Tim Piper reported that we had around \$150 in gift cards collected for use by women at the Samaritan House. The cards were delivered to Samaritan House staff the following week. Tim also read a "thank-you" card from Janis Sunderhaus, executive director of the Allen County Health Partners on East 8th Street in Lima. Their staff was greatly appreciative of the painting work done by the LAMM men's group. Ideas for future mission work were discussed. There is a possibility that we can lay tile flooring in the upstairs halls of the Samaritan House. John Mulder volunteered to look over the flooring to see if it is something that he thinks we can tackle. Norm Grigsby will look into doing mission work for the families of veteran's families or those serving overseas. Household work such as mowing and trimming was suggested. Upcoming events noted by various people included the Trinity UMC Election-day Spaghetti Supper which is open to the public. Tim will publicize upcoming events in a monthly LAMM newsletter. It was decided that we should try to meet quarterly for breakfasts rather than monthly since we have four Lima-area churches participating on a regular basis. Tim closed the meeting with a prayer.

NEW BEGINNINGS AT ST. PAUL'S CHURCH

Fall is a season of endings but also a season of beginnings. Local schools and colleges start a new year of classes. Fall sports teams start out with high hopes of a fresh start on a new season. At St. Paul's church we start new Sunday school classes and worship services containing new messages and new music. This year we have new Sunday school rooms with new drywall, paper and paint. We have new dividers for Sunday school classes in the new fellowship hall. A new Bible study invites us to explore the New Testament. Our mission work has been new as well this year. For the first time we partnered with other churches to roof a building at the United Methodist Children's home and we built a handicapped ramp for Pastor Tibb's church on South Elizabeth Street in Lima. We plan on having tailgate parties at the Elida home football games in the next month, to raise funds for new mission work and to make our church more visible to our Elida community. New youth activities are planned. For the first time, St. Paul's church plans on having a float in the Elida homecoming parade. We will have a "blessing of the pets" this fall, something new to our church. We plan on doing a survey of the Village of Elida to find out about the demographics of our community and how we as a "hometown church" may begin new mission work to serve the needs of our neighbors.

At the Administrative Council meeting on September 8th we talked about some new beginnings as well. Pastor Ruth will begin training as a leader for a new and exciting leadership revitalization program entitled ReFocus.

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ReFocus

REFOCUS: A PROCESS TOWARD A FOCUSED LIFE

On Monday, September 8, Rev. Mike Denman, Assistant to the District Superintendent of the Maumee Watershed District, presented to the Administrative Council the ReFocus Process. ReFocus is a process that allows the participants to discover where God has been at work throughout their lives, where God is currently working, and where God is calling them into the future. The ReFocus process begins with church leadership, specifically with the pastor, who joins in a Network, with other pastors for a Focused Living Retreat, and six more meetings to integrate the learnings. Together, they enter the journey of discovery, and begin to become more spiritually aware of God's presence.

The next step in ReFocus is to bring about six leaders from that pastor's congregation together for a Focused Living Retreat. After a couple of more months, the leaders gather again to learn how they can share this kind of spiritual process with the congregation. The pastor continues to meet with the Network for support and


planning. Finally, there are three Summits held where the congregation is involved in the same process for the life of the church. The whole process takes about two years, and by the end, the church has a strategic plan for ministry that is Christ centered and Spiritually focused.

After we heard Rev. Denman's presentation, the Ad Council voted to proceed with becoming a Refocused Congregation and joining a Network, which will be coordinated by David Chivington, the Assistant to the Superintendent of the Northwest Plains District, and Pastor Ruth, who has been trained as a Refocus Facilitator.

The cost of the Refocus Process for our congregation has been underwritten by grants to the District, the Northwest region, and by members of St. Paul's Church. You will be hearing more about this exciting time of discovery and growth in the life of your leadership and the church in the coming months. Pastor Ruth's Network meetings begin in November, 2008. If you have any questions about Refocus and what it means to you as a member of the congregation, please feel free to speak to Pastor Ruth.

St. Francis

Many churches celebrate the Feast of St. Francis on October 4 with a blessing of animals, recalling this Italian saint's affinity for all of God's creatures. However, Francis was more than just a lover of birds and animals. In a world of war and destruction, the saint of Assisi has much to teach us about how to live a Christly life.

Francis was born in 1182, and grew up in extreme wealth and luxury. He lived the life of a carefree playboy, and in his late teens became a warrior knight – only to be captured and spend a year as a prisoner of war.

A divine vision transformed Francis's life. He heard God calling him to repair the church, a call which Francis took in several ways. Literally, Francis began to rebuild the ruined church at San Damiano. In other ways, Francis helped to change people's perception of what it meant to be the church – the body of Christ.

At a time when the church was largely an institution that served the status quo, Francis embraced those who were outcast and welcomed them in. He founded a community that provided care for "the least" in society, and offered a home and dignity to lepers and others

who were despised.

The former soldier traveled to the Middle East, the land of the crusades. Instead of joining in the holy wars the Christians were waging, Francis tried to be a peacemaker between Christians and Muslims.

Francis taught a reverence for all of God's creation. The text for "All Creatures of Our God and King" is attributed to him. Wanting to show people that Jesus was born into humble beginnings – a peasant like them – Francis created the first nativity scene and used a manger for an altar one Christmas Eve.

Theologian Matthew Fox has suggested we take St. Francis "out of the birdbath" and give him the respect he deserves, for from this humble saint we can learn much about how to live in harmony with one another and all of creation.




The Bumble Bee

Did you know that the bumble bee cannot fly? It's a very silly question, because of course, bumble bees do fly. Yet, according to the laws of aerodynamics, they should not be able to.

A bumble bee's wings are, in theory, too small to lift the weight of its body. But, apparently, no one told the bee that fact, and so they fly. Quite well, in fact. They do so by flapping their wings not up and down, as one might expect, but back and forth.

"With God, all things are possible," Jesus reminds us in Matthew 19:26. Certainly the bumble bee is a living example of this simple but profound truth.

forever because we want those pleasurable feelings to last forever. Unfortunately, this kind of love may result in having babies at too young an age, or in more serious consequences like diseases, when we don't learn to control the "desires of the flesh." *Eros* is our most basic biological instinct for making a connection with other human beings.

The second kind of love is called *storge*, which refers to family love. It's the love between parents and children, or between siblings. While this word for love isn't in the Bible, the spirit of this kind of love is described whenever it speaks of love within a family. First Timothy 5:8 tells us that those who fail to care for their families are worse than unbelievers, which means that to live out our call as Christians, we are to have *storge*, active love for members of the family. *Storge* is our first experience of a social relationship kind of loving, and creates the bonds that allow us to form loving relationships later in life.

The third kind of love is called

philia, which refers to a warm, affectionate feeling for someone. This is the kind of love that we think of toward our close friends. Jesus used *philia* when he said he had called the disciples friends because he loved them. And, when Jesus asked Peter, "Do you love me?" the word *philia* was used. *Philia* is a part of all of our relationships where we care about the other person, when we trust the other and enjoy spending time with them. Our best friendships are expressed in *philia*.

The fourth kind of love is *agape*, the most common word for love in the New Testament. This kind of love describes the love in a relationship that becomes a marriage. "Agape means to act on behalf of the well-being of someone independently of that person's merit or even your feelings of affection." This is the love that God expressed in Christ. God acted in Jesus on behalf of our well-being, even though we didn't deserve such great love that lead to great sacrifice. It often takes a lifetime to perfect what is meant by *agape*, because *agape* requires great sacrifice and humility. We have to learn *agape*, which is the love that is meant when we live out the second part

of the Great Commandment, "Love your neighbor as yourself." It is also the love that is necessary for marriages to succeed.

Love is always expressed in words, emotions, beliefs, and behavior. When young people act too quickly in a state of *eros* love, they may miss out on the fulfilling love of *philia* and *agape* with someone to whom they are attracted. But love, when expressed appropriately, and understood as a sacred gift from God to bond our relationships with others and with God, is the ultimate expression of relationship.'

I thank God for people like Norm and Mary who have traveled together for so many years in a relationship that has been expressed in love to each other, in their family, and toward the world around them. I thank God for the young people who are just beginning that journey to learn love, and then practice love as a way of expressing God's image in themselves. God bless us all with love.


