



Many people know the "Johnny Appleseed Grace," often learning it at church camp or other similar settings. But they may not know that Johnny Appleseed was a real person. Born John Chapman in Massachusetts in 1774, he acquired his nickname because he traveled around the frontier planting countless nurseries and apple orchards. He provided numerous apple seeds to settlers, and also supported traveling missionaries, mostly of the Swedenborgian Church.

What's In A Name?

Ordinary Time. Propers. Season after Pentecost. Trinity. Kingdomtide. Season of Creation. The Sundays in the season that stretches between Pentecost and Advent go by many names and they're all correct, in one way or another.

About half of the Christian year – the seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter – are known as festival times, given over to special observances connected to the life of Jesus. The rest of the year is, for want of a better word, non-festival. In 2008 it is one of the longest in church history because Easter was so early. Over the centuries a variety of names and ways of keeping track of these Sundays has arisen:

- **Ordinary Time** – These Sundays are not “ordinary” in the regular sense of the

word, but rather as in “ordinal numbers.” Ordinary Time simply means that the Sundays get counted, without being connected to any festival.

- **Propers** – Similar in meaning to Ordinary Time, “proper” means a Sunday in its own (or proper) right, without being called by a festival name such as Lent 2 or Easter 3.
- **Season after Pentecost or Trinity** – This system simply counts the weeks after Pentecost Sunday (the last day in the Easter season) or Trinity Sunday (the week after).

- **Kingdomtide** – In the 1950s this was a suggestion for the second half of the season, starting in September, to break up the long block of Sundays. As the name suggests, it intended to focus on the reign of God. The idea didn't really take off.
- **Season of Creation** – This began in Canada in the 1960s, died out for a while, but has come back with impetus from Australia. It is a six-week observation in September and October. To learn more, go to www.seasonofcreation.com.





A short while ago you may remember me introducing our new sound board and some other items relating to it. This new board and things are the result of much debate and research. The trustees looked at systems ranging from over \$37,000.00 to the one we now have for \$2,454.50. The funding for this new equipment came out of the memorial fund and was voted on by the trustees. So there is no effect on the operating budget.

Now, for a little about the equipment. The board is a Yamaha EMX-5016CF. Basically this means it's a 16 channel, self-powered board with 500 watts per side, digital EQ and feedback suppression, plus sound effects, sound balancing, channel on, and metering. I know some of you don't know or care about that, but for those who do, it's way better than the 10 channel 100 watt, manual EQ basic board that we were using, which will most likely be used in the fellowship hall.

Some of the other new equipment includes a desk mike for the altar at the Bible: A second headset mike for mobile speakers, four new mike stands that will work much better with music stands, four new mike cords so we can use more mikes at one time, and a set of head phones for use at the board. Oh yes, and a light for the board so we can see.

So, what does all this really mean? Well, first it means that you will hear a much higher quality sound with fewer annoying sounds like feed back. Then, there is a much better quality of recordings that will be available for homebound. And portions may soon be available on St. Paul's web site. Also, recordings of special events, like holy-day services with a lot of singing, will sound much better live and on CD.

For now, though, Tim and I are still getting the sound set-up and balanced. So please be patient with us while we adjust the new equipment. Although you may not be able to hear them any better live, the piano and organ will be miked so we can get a better balance on the recordings. Getting to work on the sound only once a week means it will take a while to get things just right. But take heart, we are making good progress.

If you have any questions or just want to see the new equipment, don't be afraid to ask.







Featured Recipes from St. Paul's Cookbook

Double-Dipped Gourmet Caramel Apples

Ingredients		Instructions
4 or 5	medium apples	Wash and dry apples; insert stick into stem end of each apple. Microwave 1 pkg. caramels and 2 Tbl. water on high 2 1/2-3 1/2 minutes or until smooth, stirring every minute. Dip apples into hot caramel sauce; turn until coated. Scrape excess sauce from bottom of apples. Place on greased waxed paper. Refrigerate 1-2 hours. After refrigerating, repeat microwaving and dipping directions with remaining caramels and water for second caramel layer. Refrigerate 1-2 hours. Decorate as desired after refrigeration. Store apples in refrigerator. Let stand at room temperature 15 minutes before serving.



Holy Joe's Cafe

A small chain of cafes has served over 75,000,000 cups of coffee without charging a penny.

Bad business?

No – great ministry!

Holy Joe's Café began not as a business but as an outreach of First Congregational Church in Wallingford, Connecticut. The church decided to collect and ship coffee to military chaplains serving in Iraq and Afghanistan so that they could provide a simple coffee house ministry to troops in those areas. In just over two years the project has grown to where it supports

several coffee houses.

The idea is simple: people purchase fair trade coffee online through a supplier that then ships it to the church and they forward it to the chaplains. Through the coffee houses, the chaplains provide a safe place for the troops to get away, sit down, have a cup of coffee, talk with a chaplain, and just relax.
