PASTOR'S STUDY TO BEGIN IN OCTOBER

Pastor Ruth will be offering a study on prayer this fall on Wednesday evenings at 7:00 pm

beginning October 20. The study guide will be *Traveling the Prayer Paths of Jesus* by John Indermark. The books will be \$13.35. The class will center around learning about and practical application of different prayer practices, including: Centering Prayers (Breath prayers); The Jesus Prayer; Praying the Scriptures (Lectio Devina); Postures for Prayer; and Prayer in Creation (St. Bonaventure). The group will have a brief discussion on the reading for the week, move into learning about a prayer practice, have some time to actually practice that mode of prayer, then gather again to share the experience. FACILITY USE REQUEST

Beginning the first of September, we will be doing something new. There has been an increase in requests for use of the church, including the fellowship hall, kitchen, classrooms, and the sanctuary. The Trustees have developed a request form, approved by Administrative Council, to be completed by anyone who needs use of the church. This new system is a pro-active attempt to avoid two or more groups wanting the same space on the same day/time.

Starting September 1, 2010, a Facility Use Request Form must be completed by anyone who wants their group to use the church for any reason. Administrative Council related committees and teams will have first priority, and funerals will always take priority over any other activities. All Ad Council committees and team chairs are to complete a form indicating the days and times for their regularly scheduled meetings. The secretaries will put those on the calendar. If a committee meets on an 'as scheduled' basis, the chair will need to complete a form as soon as the meeting is decided.

As of this date, the secretaries are the only persons who will write in the church calendar. They will place your requests by first come, first served, based on the date you fill out your form. This does not include groups who will meet outside the church building, but you must let the secretaries know if you wish to have your event included in the church calendar.

You can find the forms in the rack outside the pastor's study.

Ostensibly seen in church bulletins:

- The eighth-graders will be presenting Shakespeare's *Hamlet* in the church basement on Friday at 7 p.m. The congregation is invited to attend this tragedy.
- On a church bulletin during the minister's illness: "GOD IS GOOD, Dr. Hargreaves is better."

Christian Education

New Look of Christian Education at St. Paul's UMC

Over the course of the past year I've watched as our Sunday school attendance each week has dropped to a point where our attendance for six classes, without including the church staff, was in the single digits. I saw this as undeniable evidence of a need for change. The rest of the Christian Education Committee agreed unanimously. After brainstorming numerous ideas of changes we could make this fall we weighed the options and developed a plan for the new look of Christian Education at St. Paul's. The new Christian Education program affects kids, youth, and adults alike. Our committee unanimously agreed upon this plan.

The children's and youth ministry at our church will begin meeting in the Marsh, the education wing, **September 19.** The **TADPOLE** nursery will be open each week for babies and toddlers. Preschoolers and kindergarteners will meet in the **TOADS** class and kids in grades 1-5 will meet in the **FROGS** class. Both children's classes will meet following the children's sermon each week. Parents or Guardians **MUST** sign in their children for the nursery, **TOADS** or **FROGS** classes. Children will only be released from the classrooms when the person who signed them in comes to pick them up. This is so we're in compliance with the church's safe sanctuary policies. The youth ministry, **FISH FORCE**, will meet in the fellowship hall the 2nd-5th Sundays of each month following the children's sermon.

The Christian Education Committee's plan is to move our adult ministry to a small group format. The original small group consisted of 12 people – Jesus' 12 disciples. The early church mainly met together in homes, which would limit the number to a small group. This is all described in Acts 2:42-47. John Wesley later used small groups to grow the Methodist movement. With this in mind, we examined the different types of small group formats in detail and decided that St. Paul's will use a special interest type group.

We've got many ideas for interests on the wall posters and you're welcome to continue to add topics of interest to those posters in the coming weeks. On Rally Sunday, September 12, every adult will be given a private voting sheet to let us know what groups you're interested in. Using those votes, we'll put the groups together, and the following week, the 19th, you'll be asked to get together in your groups and work out a time that you can all meet. Faith forming groups will meet weekly. The location and time of your meeting will be decided within your group based on the times that work best for all the participants in the group. Every group will begin with Home Fellowship 1, a five-week curriculum that will help you get to know your group as well as enjoy some food and fellowship.

So this is what the new look of Christian Education at St. Paul's will be. There will be no more Sunday school hour on Sunday mornings. In its place we will have a **30-minute fellowship time** each week with contemporary Christian music. Children's ministry and youth ministry will be during the worship service and adults will move to a small faith formation group format.

Harriet Richardson Ames recently got her bachelor's degree in education. That wouldn't be very significant except for the fact that she was 100 years old. Her daughter Marjorie said, "She had what I call a 'bucket list,' and that was on it."

In 1931 Ames earned a two-year teaching certificate and taught for several years in a one-room schoolhouse. She continued studying, taking classes at several different colleges. The schools researched her studies, and found she had enough credits for a degree, and so awarded her with one in January 2010.

"If I die tomorrow, I'll know I'll die happy," Ames said about earning her degree. Quite coincidentally, she died the next day.

"Let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us," reads Hebrews 12:1b. And let us never give up.

Inside work:

- Administrative filing / sorting / digitizing records
- Moved boxes of records for shredding
- Significant sorting / organizing and redirecting items in building 109
- Painted the inside of two cottages
- Provided new window treatments for two cottages
- Sanded / sealed wood cottage furniture in all 5 cottages

Outside work:

- Gutters removed and wood prepped for new installation on the school
- Pavement holes patched and sealed
- Large brush pile chipped
- Replaced second story windows and wood on the dining hall
- Removed playground equipment
- Landscaped cottages
- Provided new, handmade picnic tables for the cottages
- Removed furniture from the conference basement
- Mowed 40 acre campus two times

The people of St. Paul's did a wonderful job of supporting this mission week with their participation in the work week, contribution money, encouragement, and support through prayer. All of the support was important to make this years' mission to UMCH a success and another example in showing God's love and encouragement to those in need.

We look forward to the fourth annual UMCH work week next year.

St. Paul's Men Participate at Brad Joseph Memorial Golf Outing

Some of the men of St. Paul's Church participated in the Brad Joseph Memorial Golf Outing on July 31st at the Bluffton Golf Course. A foursome of Norman Grigsby, Gene Craft, Tim Theodore and Tim Piper participated in something resembling golf, of which all proceeds go to the Bradley Joseph Memorial fund. Our group got their money's worth and visited parts of the Bluffton Golf Course rarely seen by outsiders. Bill McKinney also attended the outing and gave a generous donation to the memorial fund.

Brad Joseph was a member of our St. Paul's congregation until he was tragically killed in a car accident in the fall of 2007. Brad was our youth director, sang in the Chancel Choir, took care of our church computers and participated in various mission trips. Perhaps his favorite mission was going six years in a row to the United Methodist Medical Mission in Progresso Nuevo, Mexico, where as a pharmacist, he filled prescriptions for the poor people that were served on the mission. The golf outing is held annually by Brad's family to raise money to send pharmacy interns on medical missions all over the world. In 2009 a girl named Kelly was awarded money from the fund and went on a medical mission to Uganda. This year, a girl named Rebecca received money from the memorial fund to go on a medical mission to Kenya. Rebecca stated "I will use my faith, my service, my passion and my pharmacy knowledge to impact many people in Kenya." Also this year a girl named Ashley used the memorial fund to go on a medical mission to the Dominican Republic. Brad Joseph is no longer with us but his spirit lives on in the work being done in his name by the recipients of the scholarships awarded from the Brad Joseph Memorial Fund. Praise God for the life of Brad Joseph and for his family honoring him and God by the mission work being funded by his memorial fund!
